seves will have a bearing on restrictive legislation, which could impose a hardship on everyone driving a logging truck.

Interim Committee

He said the interim committee appointed by the legislature will make a highway legislative study. The recommendations this committee makes to the legislature in the next two years will have an important bearing on what happens to the highway and the logging industry.

Stewart closed his talk by reminding those present that if "you have a legitimate beef, you can get action, and this applies to every department of state, regardless."

Jack Curtis, who has spent a great deal of time with the Oregon Timber Transport Operators and is auto safety director of the organization, called attention to what makes accidents, namely ignorance, indifference, impatience and improper equipment. He said there was \$1,000,000 worth of accidents in 1952. He told of an accident near McMinnville recently where it cost a log truck owner \$7,000 for an accident for which he was not to blame.

County Budgeteers Okay Reappraisal Of Lane County

The six-man Lane county budget committee has approved a fund of \$77,710 for the reappraisal of Lane county for tax purposes. The committee will also consider a requested \$80,260 for the operation of the county assessor's office. The program calls for a reappraisal of the county by 1958 and will be handled jointly by the state and county at an estimated cost of \$412,000, fifty percent of which is to be borne by Lane county.

The sum to be set aside for the work will cover the work to be done in 1953-54 and will include the aerial photographing of one third of the county, mapping of 700,000 acres, cruising of 20,000 acres and the miscellaneous work necessary to carry out the project.

Hospital Employs Office Manager

Cottage Grove hospital has announced that Kermit Lighter of Bozeman, Mont., who has had 14 years experience in personnel work with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has been employed as office manager at the hospital here.

Mr. Lighter is a native of Iowa, but has been in Montana since 1928. He is a long time friend of Fred Morris, hospital supervisor, and they were employed together at the bank in Baker, Mont., and also worked together for the Agriculture department. Mr. Lighter had 10 years banking experience before joining the Agriculture department and his last position was as cashier.

He attended business college in Minneapolis. He is married and has one married daughter who resides in California.

Rash of Soldiers AWOL Plague City

The Cottage Grove police department has been plagued with a rash of AWOL soldiers during the past two months, with nine jailed here. One deserter also was put in custody.

Three soldiers, all from Camp Stoneman, Calif., were arrested on the 13th and turned over to authorities. Others arrested during April and May were also held for officials.

Several were nabbed while hitchhiking, others discovered after being arrested for disorderly conduct and driving under the influence of alcohol.

Surviving besides his widow are

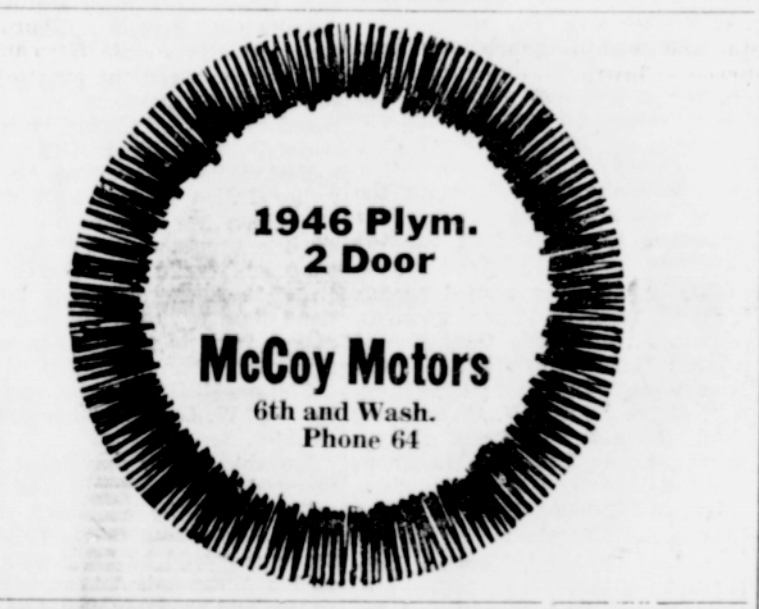
