NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN: That at a special election to be held in the City of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon, on Friday the 11th day of June, 1953, from the hour of eight o'clock A. M. to the hour of eight o'clock P. M. of said day, there will be submitted to the electors of the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon, the following question:

"SHALL THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE BE AUTHORIZED TO EXCEED THE CONSTITUTIONAL SIX PER CENT (6%) LIMITATION OF OREGON AS PROVIDED IN SECTION 11, ARTICLE XI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF OREGON IN THE SUM OF \$76,028.75 FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING ADDITIONAL FUNDS FOR THE GENERAL STREET, SEWER, EMERGENCY, LIBRARY AND PARK FUNDS," AS PROVIDED BY ORDINANCE NO. 1428.

The polling places, judges and clerks of said special election are as follows, to-wit:

Ward Three, Precinct Four—Pearl Safley Residence, 1133 East Main Street, Cottage Grove, Oregon. Judges: Rosetta Harpole, Pearl Safley. Clerk: May Tennis.

This special election is called pursuant to Ordinance No. 1429 passed by the Common Council and approved by the Mayor on May 18, 1953.

ORDINANCE NO. 1428

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING AN INCREASED TAX LEVY OF \$76,028.75 OVER THE AMOUNT LIMITED BY SECTION 11 ARTICLE XI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, OREGON, FOR THE ENSUING FISCAL PERIOD JULY 1, 1953 TO JUNE 30, 1954.

WHEREAS, The Budget of the City of Cottage Grove, as prepared by the Budget Committee, for the ensuing fiscal year July 1, 1953, to June 30, 1954, calls for a tax levy as follows, to-wit:

Total levy all funds \$102,421.92

Less Principal and Interest Bonds NONE

Within 6% Limitation 26,393.17

Outside 6% Limitation 76,028.75

against all of the taxable property within the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon, for the purpose of deriving funds necessary to carry on the different departments and

meet the expenses of the City Government of said City and create sinking funds for the various outstanding bonds and obligations of the City; and

WHEREAS The levy within the constitutional limitation of Section 11 Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, based upon the highest tax levy within the last three years plus six per cent (6%) is \$26,393.17 not including bond and warrant indebtedness of nothing which amount is not sufficient for raising funds necessary to carry on the different departments and meet the expenses of the City Government of said City and create sinking funds for the various outstanding bonds and obligations of said City, and the amount of tax necessary for said purpose in excess of the six per cent (6%) limitation proposed to be levied for ensuing fiscal year July 1, 1953, to June 30, 1954, is \$76,028.75.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, DO ORDAIN:

Section 1: That the annual levy of taxes for the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon, for the ensuing fiscal year July 1, 1953, to June 30, 1954, be increased \$76,028.75 over the amount limited by Section 11 Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, based upon the highest levy within the last three years plus six per cent (6%) amounting to \$26,393.17 and the said amount of \$76,028.75 being in excess of the six per cent (6%) limitation aforesaid, being necessary in order to derive funds to carry on the different departments of said City and to meet the expenses of the Government of said City, caused by the increased cost of labor and material, and to provide further and additional funds for street construction and repairs and for an increased amount for library fund and for other necessary expenses.

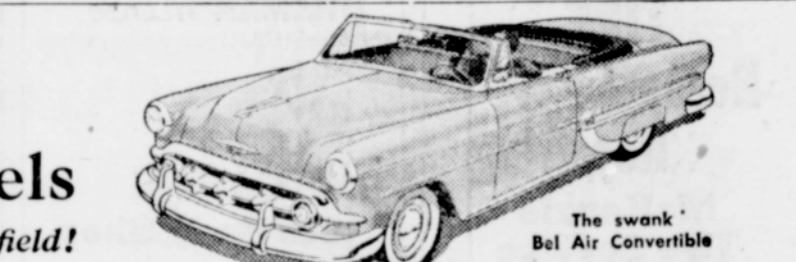

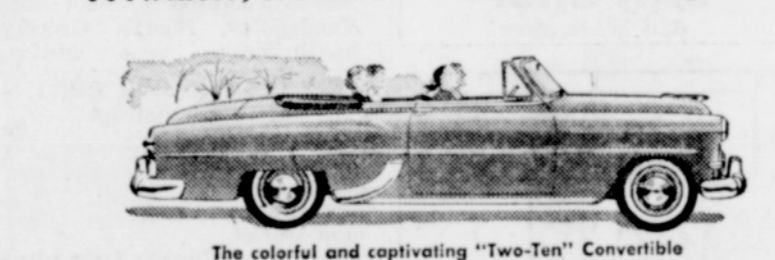

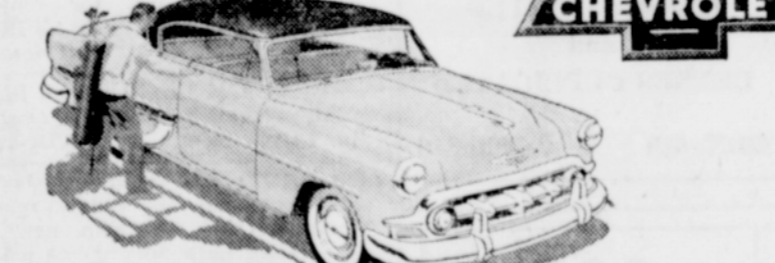
