### EXAMS FOR MILITARY AND NAVAL ACADEMIES SLATED FOR JULY 13

Congressman Harris Ellsworth announced recently that competitive examinations for appointments to vacancies at the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland, and the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, New York, will be conducted by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Monday, July 13, 1953, at the post office building in Albany, Coos Bay, Eugene, Grants Pass, Medford, Reedsport, and Roseburg.

Candidates for the Academies must never have been married, and must be bonafide residents of the fourth congressional district. As of the date of entrance into the academies, July 1, 1954, appointees must be 17 years of age. The maximum entrance ages for Annapolis and West Point are 21 and 22 respectively. Candidates now in the armed services are eligible to compete.

### Crepeau to Speak At Demo's Dinner

Mayor Joe S. Crepeau of Cottage Grove and Edward C. Harms Jr., mayor of Springfield, will give the welcoming messages at the Western Oregon Jefferson Jackson Day Banquet Friday, May 22, at 7 p. m. at the Springfield Memorial Building.

The dinner, sponsored by the Lane county Democratic committee, is the major political dinner of the year. Hugh B. Mitchell, former U. S. senator from Washington and U. S. Representative from Seattle will give the keynote address.

Mitchell is a leading exponent of power and resource development for the Pacific Northwest and served as chairman for the League for CVA and has sponsored legislation calling for development of Hell's Canyon dam.

Terry D. Schunk, sheriff of Multnomah county and chairman of the Oregon delegation to the 1952 Democratic national convention, will also speak.

Tickets can be purchased in Cottage Grove at the D-M cafe and will also be available at the dinner.

The Legion Auxiliary members serve as unpaid volunteer saleswomen with the entire proceeds of the sales set aside entirely for the rehabilitation of the veteran and welfare of his children.
