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A Better Shopping Center

Most of us, who have a part in making this community a better place to live, are interested in seeing a more progressive, wide awake shopping center. There has been a number of ideas advanced on how this might be done, but difficulties have been encountered—one is that the idea, however meritorious, never got into the planning stage and the second difficulty is that it seems hard to find people to agree to any one idea.

Perhaps being unable to agree on a good plan to advance the interests of the community is typical of the community the size of ours, but in most places where growth is in evidence, we see bickering and lack of cooperation disappear.

One thing we lack—so far as we know there has never been a planned program to boost retail sales. Perhaps this may come in time. Cities and towns that have tried it say that thru a coordinated program of community unit, a city or town can boost its retail trade.

Here are four points that have been tried and brought results: (1) A wide variety of merchandise, (2) courteous and efficient salesmen and saleswomen, (3) clean, modern, attractive, up-to-date stores, and (4) reasonable prices and some honest to goodness bargains.

We do not believe an accurate survey of our buying power has been made. In looking over some statistics gathered from other cities, we found some interesting comparisons, which would make our total retail sales look rather bad, in the light of the estimated 18,000 people the Chamber of Commerce says we have in our trade area, but which figure we seriously doubt. Here are some figures from larger cities, which show some of the larger cities have trade at home troubles too, but not in comparison to ours. A city of 18,200 did \$24,234,000 worth of retail business in 1950. The effective buying income in the city was \$26,062,000, which shows the people were leaving the city to buy elsewhere or else saving a lot of money. In 1951 a similar city had a population of 26,000 and did \$37,545,000 worth of business while it had a buying power of \$38,896,000.

We will soon have another medium of advertising as an outlet for local sales. It appears to us that some who have dropped remarks here and there are rather relying complacently on this medium to move a lot of merchandise with no effort on the part of the merchant. There is no Cinderella method of selling without effort. The merchant will still have to do merchandising, have the right prices on his merchandise in an attractive store staffed by competent and pleasant sales people.

Fitting Tribute

Florists are disturbed over the expression found in some obituaries, which says "in lieu of flowers", when the deceased wishes contributions made to some cause. The expression "in lieu of" cheapens flowers as a tribute, many flower growers believe.

Flowers thrive in the northwest, whether they are grown by the individual or by the greenhouse. They have been used on many occasions as a tribute in times of sadness, of joy and of sorrow. To many people nothing will ever take the place of the flower in expressing the sentiments desired.

COMSTOCK CEMETERY

New Highway 99 has covered the last traces of the once important village of Comstock. Years ago it's postoffice was transferred to Curtin, and finally the Anlauf postoffice was also transferred to the same place, leaving the Curtin office the only one in the eighteen miles between Cottage Grove and Drain, but on a high hill unique Comstock cemetery still looks out over the Pass Creek valley, and a straight four lane highway, where so recently a muddy trail wound like a snake.

In this cemetery is the grave of a veteran of the Cherokee Indian war, and the fir-clad surrounding hills have many times tossed back the heartbreaking lullaby echos of the bugle playing taps for the veterans of all the wars since.

C. R. Lawrence and wife donated the ground for this so different cemetery to their neighbors 42 years ago. No money is paid for lots there. The only stipulation is that it be for those who live near. Of course, there are a few exceptions, like that early grave of an unknown whose body was scooped in pieces from the nearby R. R. tracks, but mostly, just our own folk lie in the green, tree-shaded plots, and no sexton digs the graves. Sorrowing friends make them ready, with good talk of the one who is to lie in it. Business shuts down, and most everyone goes to "show respect" and remain to walk among the graves to visit and recall the virtues (and vices?) of their occupants. It isn't modern at all.

Lately donations came in and a kind of custom has been established to send a dollar a year to keep the place up. There is a good steel fence now, and each year someone is hired to mow the weeds and grass, and many meet for a picnic and to tidy things up.

This is written to let relatives of those lying in Comstock Cemetery know that such contributions from them would be welcome, and if a certain branch of the Clark family see this, will they write and give permission to cut the brush and trees from their plot? It is enclosed with a really lovely picket fence, decorated with hand carvings and put together without nails of any kind. Would be outstandingly attractive if the brush were cleared away.

Also some are getting together to put cement curbs around the plots. If interested write. Address all communications to Curtin Postmaster and they will be given to those interested in the upkeep of this unusual cemetery.
