## Get Behind Community Enterprises

One thing should be noted and that is if any community enterprise is to succeed the community as a whole must get behind it. From the comment we hear the seventh annual rodeo was the best show in local history. The event brought lots of new people into town.

The rodeo ought to be a part of the Chamber of Commerce program. The businessmen as a group should work with the Chamber of Commerce and the Cottage Grove Riding club in handling details which assures success of ventures of this sort.

## Autos Lead Expenses

The industrial history in the United States for nearly four decades has been shaped by the passionate love of the American for his automobile. Nineteen-fifty-two was no exception, and it appears that 1953 will carry on the story.

In a tabulation by the National City Bank of the largest American corporations on the basis of sales in 1952, the 25 largest corporations are shown to have sold \$56,635,000,000 worth of goods. And of this, 42½ percent—or \$24,150,000,000—was credited directly to automotive business.

First-half 1953 has seen automobiles made at a record pace, but now come reports that used cars—which must be sold before the dealer gets home with his profit—are piling up on lots. The automobile industry is sure it can sell all the cars it makes this year, but chances are that the second half will see cutbacks in production.

## Forced Security

Down in Mississippi a woman is spending a lot of money to seek the privilege of providing her own old-age security instead of having to buy that kind of insurance from the federal government. She is Mrs. Mary Cain, editor of a small newspaper.

A United States District Court has just ruled against Mrs. Cain. The judge has held she must pay taxes under the Social Security Act as a self-employed person. The ruling apparently was based mainly on the constitutionality of the act, which has been upheld by the United States Supreme Court.

Mrs. Cain says she will carry her suit to the Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court if necessary. But even if she should sustain the constitutional power of Congress to levy such a tax, there is still a question remaining—which it would be well to consider now:

Should there not be some area in the United States in which a person could take responsibility for his own financial future, and where better than in self-employment? In other words, why not voluntary rather than compulsory old-age insurance for the self-employed?

## As Practical as a Sack of Potatoes

Throughout the country, chambers of commerce, civic organizations, banks and other groups are actively engaged in seeking to bring more industry to their communities. They want the spending and employment that come with expanded industrial activity.

This is a perfectly natural and desirable state of affairs. However, in rural sections of the nation, there is another and equally important possibility which is generally overlooked.

That is to work for the improvement, in a scientific and orderly manner, of farm production. If, for instance, any region's farm output and farm income could be raised by 20 or 25 percent the beneficial effects would be felt by everyone. And this would be of lasting service to the country as a whole, which must face the problem of feeding a swiftly growing population from a fixed land area.

Greatly increased farm production is no impossible ideal—it is as practical as a sack of potatoes. It can be accomplished by maximum use of machinery in farming, coupled with proven land conservation techniques. It has been said, with full accuracy, that the tractor revolutionized farming. That revolution is nowhere near complete—present-day farm equipment makes it possible to mechanize the work of the land as thoroughly as the work of the modern factory.

The future strength of this country will depend every bit as much on progress in farming as on progress in industry. The two go together like the fingers of a hand.

## Traffic Death Rate Is Lower This Year

For the first time since January, traffic deaths on Oregon highways have been slumped below last year, the Secretary of State's traffic safety division reported recently.

June fatalities totaled 30, as compared with 45 last June. The June toll, a tentative figure, brought this year's traffic count to 179. Last year the state had recorded 185 deaths for the same period.

Safety officials said the lowered figure may be partially attributed to generally unfavorable weather during June which kept week end traffic below normal.

Unfortunately, safety men said the decrease cannot be credited to better driving since reports indicate motorists were convicted of more than 4,000 driving violations, which cause 94½ of all accidents, during the month.

With better weather ahead, safety officials expressed doubt that the relatively low June figure will have any effect on the over-all toll for the year. As soon as vacation season gets into full swing, they said, deaths in accidents probably will shoot upward again.

## Navy Explains Plan To Retired Reserve

Information concerning the transfer to the retired reserve without pay of members of the Naval Reserve is included in a recent Bureau of Naval Personnel reserve instructions.

This instruction cites the privileges of retired Naval reservists not on active duty as well as their obligations in time of war or national emergency declared by Congress or when otherwise authorized by law.

Retired reservists may be ordered to active duty without their consent only when the Secretary of the Navy with approval of the Secretary of Defense determines that adequate numbers of members of reserve components in an active status are not readily available. Restrictions on retired reservists include prohibition from wearing the uniform in connection with nonmilitary, personal, or civilian enterprises or activities of a civilian nature.

The directive further stipulates that an officer who has been specially commended by the head of the executive department for performance of duty in actual combat for an act of service performed prior to January 1, 1947, will, when retired, be placed on the retired list in the next higher grade than that in which serving at the time of retirement.

We are writing you in reference to your article which appeared on page one of your newspaper dated June 25, 1953, to wit, the Cottage Grove Sentinel. We are referring to the caption beneath the picture of the two National Guardsmen from the state of Oregon.

If you will notice closely the weapon in the foregoing picture is not a Browning Automatic rifle, but a Browning Light Machine gun, calibre 30, M 1919, A-4.

This may seem like only a slight difference to you, but however, to us who are serving in a rifle company, it is considered one of the gravest of errors. We would like this to serve as a reminder to you and your readers that we of the Marine Corps have carried the Browning Automatic Rifle up the barren slopes of Bunker and the rugged craig of Vegar. The B. A. R. has always been respected in the Marine Corps as the basic and best weapon ever carried by an infantryman in combat.

Therefore, we would like to point out the great difference between the Browning Automatic Rifle and the Browning Light Machine gun, in that, we may assume you will rectify your error in a subsequent issue. Thank you.

## SAGINAW RECALL

Dear Editor:

There is some misunderstanding regarding the reasons for the recall of some of the school board members of the Saginaw district.

Those who favored the recall were not opposed to spending money necessary to keep the school up to standard, but because much more money was spent than was necessary for this. The expenses far exceeded the amount recommended by the Rural School board, and over a period of three years under this board's management there was a 4000% millage increase in taxes. This is not consistent with good business and was not necessary to bring the school up to the state standards.

Also a new street was made crossing the school grounds and the street which crossed the grounds in a different place was never closed, so there are now two streets instead of one and owing to the location of the second street it is a far greater hazard to life and limb of the school children than the first one.

These are some of the reasons for the recall.

## BOOKLET GIVES LAYMAN KNOWLEDGE OF HEART

To give the layman a sound basis for an understanding of his heart, the major heart diseases, and their symptoms, the Oregon Heart Association announces availability of a new inexpensive booklet edition of "You and Your Heart," written by five well-known American cardiologists, and edited by Dr. H. M. Marvin, who is also one of the authors.

In his introduction to the book Dr. Marvin states that "You and Your Heart" is not a self-help book, designed to enable the reader to make diagnoses and prescribe treatment, but is intended, rather, to "bring some measure of enlightenment and understanding to all who read it, and great comfort to many who have suffered needless anxiety through misunderstanding or lack of knowledge."

## LIQUOR SHOWS ONLY 1% INCREASE UNDER NEW LAW

Despite issuance of 466 liquor-by-the-drink licenses during May, the number of retail premises where alcoholic beverages may be purchased remains almost stable with less than one per cent increase, the Oregon liquor control commission reports.

Although there are 28 more retail outlets since dispenser licensing began, there is a drop of 42 taverns, six restaurants and 48 package beer licenses. The fact that so many premises have more than one license also controls the number of outlets.

## Lumber Industry Wage Negotiation Reviewed Recently

At a special but informal meeting of logging, sawmilling and plywood representatives in Tacoma recently, wage negotiations were subjected to a searching review in the light of cancellations and new declines in the lumber market reported this week.

Major reasons for further gloom in the market outlook was U.S. Army cancellation this week of 50 lumber contracts for Korea. Twenty companies lost a total of 34 million feet of boards and timbers previously scheduled for shipment between July and October this year. Some of the lumber, which was to be produced in mills throughout the Douglas fir region, had already been cut and set aside for loading. Major impact of the cancellation was felt in the Columbia River, Grays Harbor and Puget Sound areas.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Walter Durham, Jr., manager of the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations committee in Seattle and Portland stated that "It is too early to tell what effect the recent Army cancellations would have on the wage negotiations now in progress with the various AFL and CIO unions. However, the offer to renew existing wage contracts as proposed by I. J. Greeley on behalf of eight employer associations is still before the unions."

## Wheat Law Situation To Be Explained Fri.

The wheat supply situation and the law pertaining to wheat acreage allotments and quotas will be explained to interested people at a meeting to be held in the 4-H club building on the county fair grounds in Eugene at 8 p.m., Friday, July 17, according to O. S. Fletcher, county extension agent. The meeting has been arranged by the county extension offices and the Lane County PMA Committee.

In order that this meeting may be of most value to wheat growers, the sponsors have arranged for the following people to take part in the program: J. W. Scheel, Assistant Director of Extension Service, Oregon State college; John Shephard and Ted Dunwoodie, Oregon State PMA committee; Morris Wilson, Gilliam County farmer and Oregon Wheat League representative; and Dick Baum, Oregon Wheat commission. The speakers will explain the wheat situation and law and answer questions.

## FARM MACHINE CHECKS ADVISED FOR SAFETY

Oregon farmers are reminded that July 19 to 25 is the 10th annual National Farm Safety week. M. J. Huber, Oregon State college extension agricultural engineer, says keeping machines in good repair is one of the farm safety commandments.

Keep machinery in safe working condition by constantly checking its operation and make sure all safety guards are in place, advises the specialist. Other safety precautions are to stop machines before oiling, unclogging or adjusting them.
