If we were picking the enterprises Cottage Grove needs most, we would put a municipal swimming pool first on our list. In this we would be merely exercising a bit of the so called common sense, the average thrifty householder uses when he purchases the things he most needs in the order he can afford them.

Outside of the community hospital we have, we would choose a swimming pool as a community institution most likely to save human lives. We are mindful of the fact that the nation as a whole is spending millions of dollars to make life safer on the highways, on the streets and in other places which may be a hazard to human life.

Several lives might have been saved, if we had had a swimming pool several years ago. The toll of deaths at the Cottage Grove lake numbers four, we are told. Accidents in other nearby streams would bring the death toll greater.

The people behind the South Lane Recreation Inc., are not only interested in preventing tragedies by drownings, but they are desirous for the youth to swim, so that mishaps may be avoided in the future. They want the young people to swim where they can be seen and where accidents can be prevented.

Aside from the fact of teaching the young how to save his own life in the water, the pool will provide needed recreation for all the boys and girls of this area. In the guidance of youth, juvenile authorities blame the lack of recreation or lack of a place to go as a major factor in juvenile delinquency. Many communities, seeing the need have hastened to provide recreation facilities. But in this community, there is no community wide effort to provide such facilities. A few local churches do provide these facilities and the church effort is helpful, but can not help the youth of all sections.

There is also the American Legion Junior baseball project, co-sponsored by Floyd Githens.

A financial campaign will soon be underway to provide both a pool and bath house. It will be your privilege to donate to this cause. If an average of \$25.00 per family could be secured, the total amount would insure the building of needed facilities. A swimming pool could well be a recreation center and could be a reality in 1954 with proper public response.

EIGHT CZECHS AND COMMUNISM

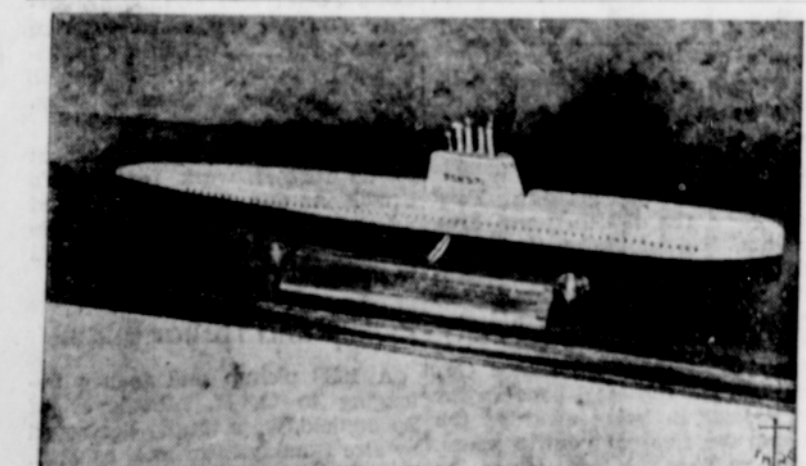
TRAIN-MOTOR VEHICLE ACCIDENTS

The train-motor vehicle accidents are on the increase in the state according to the Traffic Safety Division of the office of Secretary of State. Seven deaths have resulted from such collisions since May. This brings the total deaths from this cause to 10. Most accidents happen when vehicle drivers misjudge the speed of trains. This is particularly true in the rural areas, where drivers often try to beat diesel powered trains traveling at 80 miles per hour. Some accidents occur when drivers are not alert due to crossing the tracks regularly.

This being the week of the Old Schoolmates picnic, I am reminded that last year at about this time a picture appeared in the Sentinel as the first graduating class of the Cottage Grove high school. I should like to say, it was not the first but the second.

I have tried without success to find a picture of the first class but all members, with one possible exception are deceased. Three of the class were Lottie Knox, Henry Veatch and Ralph Whipple. I believe there were five in all and that the other two were Lillie Lurch and Fate Long. J. P. Holland was principal of the school at that time.

Roy Knox in the Sentinel picture was a brother of Lottie and Celia Lurch in the picture a sister of Lillie.

After graduating Ralph Whipple entered the University of Oregon and Henry Veatch went to Corvallis, then the Oregon Agricultural College, where, by the way, his father, R. M. Veatch, had graduated with the first class as did also, the late J. P. Currin, civil engineer, teacher, long time resident, druggist and postmaster of Cottage Grove and father of Lula Currin, a member of the class in the Sentinel picture.

Lottie Knox passed away soon after her graduation, during a diphtheria epidemic that took a heavy toll in Cottage Grove. Ralph Whipple died in Tracy, Calif., about 1916. Fate Long died in Cottage Grove several years ago and Henry Veatch died in Portland in 1935.
