## 44 Local People Attend Convention In New York, 19-26

A delegation of 44 Jehovah's Witnesses, slightly less than originally planned, have all returned to Cottage Grove after attending the International convention of Jehovah's Witnesses at Yankee Stadium in New York City.

D. L. Howard, presiding minister and head of the local delegation reports that the convention was a huge success from the opening day, July 19, when 126,387 attended, until the climax on Sunday, July 26, when 165,829 were in attendance to hear N. H. Knorr, president of the Watchtower Society, deliver the public address: "After Armageddon—God's New World."

Mr. Howard states that the convention was carried out in a very orderly manner in spite of the large crowds. One example of the efficiency was the cafeteria at the stadium, manned by volunteer workers, which could feed 30,000 persons per hour. This was visited by Naval officials, Civil Defense observers and food inspectors, all studying the mass-feeding techniques.

Also an example of the orderliness which marked the convention was the baptism, at which 4,640 symbolized their dedication to do God's will. This event took five hours and was one of the highlights of the convention.

The delegates also received many new Bible aids in the form of books and booklets to help them in their ministry work.

"It is evident," Mr. Howard said, "that people of all races, nations and tongues can get along in perfect unity when they use Bible as their medium, as was proved at this convention. We expect a greater expansion and increase in our ministry as a result of this gathering."

## Overseas Relief Clothing Drive Set by Ministers

A community-wide clothing drive is being planned by the Ministerial Association for the month of September. At the urgent request of the Church World Service, used clothing will be sent to a number of countries, especially Korea before winter sets in. F. Sherwood Smith, pastor of Gibbs Avenue Church of Christ, was appointed to make the local arrangements. Depositories will be made available in the churches and downtown in some central location. It is urged that with the old clothing 8c per pound be given to cover the cost of shipping abroad.
