### Emergency Closure On Imnaha River

An emergency angling closure to protect migrating spring chinook salmon in the Imnaha river was put into effect by the Oregon State Game Commission August 3.

The following area is closed to all angling: From a rock slide at a point commonly known as "The Saddle" near the 15-mile post on the Imnaha road, to a posted point approximately 300 yards downstream.

A recently developed rock slide was the cause of the closure. When the slide blocked the passage for the salmon, a small channel was constructed to let them pass, but there is a tremendous concentration of fish just below the slide where they are waiting to go on upstream.

Since the run up the Imnaha is relatively small, it is essential that a sufficient number of fish be permitted to escape so that the run may continue in future years.

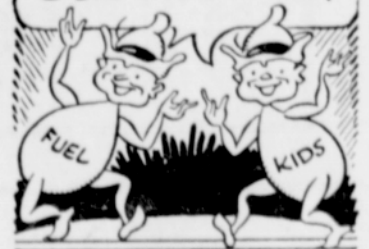
### FAMILIES ATTEND GOLF TOURNAMENT
