## Milk Surplus Decrease Seen By OSC Economist

Surpluses of milk products are not as serious in the long run as they now appear, according to an Oregon State college extension economist. M. D. Thomas says American consumers are in the midst of a revolution in the use of milk and milk products that shows promise of balancing out for the dairyman.

Americans are consuming less butter, Thomas explains, but more milk and other dairy products. In 1942, Americans used on the average about 16 pounds of butter a year. The figure has now dropped to about half that amount. Less milk is being used for animal feed, too.

However, human consumption of whole milk, cheese and ice cream has increased, and the use of non-fat dry milk, various skimmed milk drinks and other products containing non-fat dry milk solids is steadily expanding. Thus far, increased use of these products has not made up for the decline in butter sales and feed uses. This has resulted in surplus which Thomas believes will gradually diminish.

## Growth Promoting Compound Found By OSC Scientists

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—In their search for new vitamins and growth factors, biochemists at Oregon State college have discovered a compound that doubles bacteria growth during the first 12 hours of life and that may have a role in human and animal nutrition of the future.

How important glucosyl-glycine may be in human growth is as yet undetermined but its "quick growing-up" effect on bacteria is remarkable.

Compound treated organisms are as big in 12 hours as they normally grow in the first 24. After three days, the two groups are the same size—an indication that in time the bacteria produces the growth factor itself but cannot do it at first.

Scientists working on the compound are Dr. Vernon H. Cheldelin, Dr. Tsao E. King and Dexter Rogers. The research is one of the original projects of the Science Research Institute, which was established at OSC last year.

Found in liver, yeast, milk and other foods, the compound is made in the laboratory by condensing glucose with glycerine, a common amino acid of meats and other protein foods. The homemaker probably produces the compound every time she bakes bread or makes a stew. Dr. Cheldelin points out, since the inter-action of the chemicals proceeds easily at cooking temperature.

If the compound is shown to be beneficial, it may be a basic explanation of one of the values of cooking food, he explains. The search for new vitamins project is supported by funds from Swift & company and the Nutrition Foundation. The three OSC scientists working on the project have earlier written more than 75 scientific articles on vitamins, enzymes and nutrition.

## Oregon Cows Rank 3rd in State's Farm Earnings

Oregon's 203,000 milk cows are the third most important source of farm income in the state, earning \$56,948,000 for their owners last year, a survey by American Can company reveals. Dr. Glenn Cunningham, economist for the container-making firm, said dairy products rank behind only beef cattle and wheat in value to Beaver State farmers. He pointed out that Oregon cows produced on average of 5,880 pounds of milk each in 1952, topping the national average by more than 10 per cent.

## Town-Country Church Meeting

The importance of the church in Oregon's changing rural communities will keynote the seventh annual Oregon Town and Country church conference at Oregon State college, October, 12 to 15, according to Mrs. Mabel Mack, assistant director of extension service at the college and general chairman of the conference.

The inter-denominational conference, sponsored jointly by church and farm groups and the college, is designed to assist ministers and lay leaders interested in enriching the spiritual life of Oregon's rural communities.
