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Is Ike 'Strong' or 'Weak'

Some historians have divided the Presidents of the United States into two rather arbitrarily-defined groups. The first consists of the so-called "weak" Presidents; the other, of the so-called "strong" Presidents. The difference is not on of ability or character or resolution on the part of the Presidents concerned. It is, instead, a difference in attitude toward the philosophy of government. The first group consists of Chief Executives who believed that the Presidential duty is to suggest courses of policy and legislation, and then to abide by whatever Congress decides with a minimum of controversy. In other words, they regarded the Presidency as primarily an administrative job. The second group worked on the principle that the President has the right and even the obligation to dominate and direct Congress, using every means at his command toward that end.

To take specific cases, these historians often cite Calvin Coolidge as a near-perfect example of the first group, and Franklin Roosevelt as a near-perfect example of the second group. The latter reached something of a new high in efforts to totally dominate all branches of the government in his unsuccessful Supreme Court packing plan.

It is no secret that some segments of the Republican party—made up, for the most part, of younger elements—have been gravely disappointed in President Eisenhower's conduct of the Executive-Congressional relationship. They expected that he would be an extremely "strong" President, who would move heaven and earth to get his ideas over and who would brook no delay or opposition. The fact that Mr. Eisenhower had been a soldier of the highest rank, whose orders were instantly translated into action, no doubt fed this belief. Now, after watching the Administration at work for a few months, they are feeling and saying that unless the President shows much more force and initiative Congress will dominate the White House and the country will be without dynamic, effective leadership. The Democrats, naturally, have tried to make hay out of this, with such wisecracks as the one that says Harry Truman left the White House on January 20 and no one else has moved in.

On the other hand, there are a great many men within and without the GOP, and this includes some of the most influential editorialists and commentators, who believe that Mr. Eisenhower's course is close to 100 percent right. During previous Administrations, they believe, the balance between the executive and legislative branches went all askew, and very dangerously so. The new President, as they see it, is trying, and trying successfully, to restore that balance, in accord with Constitutional ideas. This does not mean that he will jettison his program or any part of it. It does mean, however, that he is convinced that honest compromise and amicable settlement of differences through negotiation are a vital factor in the democratic process. In sum, he does not seem to be a "whole hog or none" man.

Actually, the fact that parts of the Presidential program are moving through the legislative mill more slowly than many anticipated is no sign of weakness on anyone's part. There is simply much less evidence of steam-roller tactics than in previous Congresses. And there is more thorough debate and consideration of the issues and problems, in all their incredible complexity.

More Boating Deaths

Five more recent fatalities in the Pacific Northwest have pointed up the Coast Guard's boating safety campaign. Overshadowing all other prerequisites to safety is the carrying and wearing of life preservers. Not long ago the Coast Guard released news describing the ominous risks of neglect in this respect, and then recent actual case examples of capsizings and drownings in Washington and Oregon were pointed out. Throughout its safety campaign this year the Coast Guard has stressed the dangers involved when cruising and fishing in outboard motorboats. Specifically emphasized have been the hazards of overloading, ignorance of danger areas and tide conditions, and above, the wearing of Coast Guard approved life preservers. Still many of the boating public are not responding to these recommended practices. The last two weeks have again shown a host of boating deaths, all of which could have been prevented had life-jackets been worn.

On the Oregon coast this week, south of the Umpqua river near the south jetty, a small outboard capsized. Three lives were lost. Life-jackets were not worn. In fact, there is no evidence that they were even carried aboard the skiff. To be cruising in the turbulent surf which marks the area around the south jetty WITH life preservers is dangerous enough; without them, death is almost a certainty.

Also, in Oregon near Reedsport, a small boy fell from a skiff and drowned immediately. He was not wearing a life preserver.

On Lake Coeur d'Alene in Idaho last week six people boarded a 14 foot outboard. After some cruising the boat struck a submerged log and capsized, spilling out its occupants. One person drowned who failed to stay with the boat. The others, clinging to the overturned boat, were rescued some time later. The boat was overloaded and no life jackets were worn or carried.

These are but three of the many boating disasters that occur every year. These casualties and tragic loss of life have been a direct result of IGNORANCE and CARELESSNESS—CARELESSNESS in boat operation, and IGNORANCE of safety precautions and Coast Guard regulations.

With the summer months well under way we must continue to urge safety and eliminate those factors most responsible for boating deaths. Self-instruction by every member of the boating public is the surest way to achieve this end.

Contact your nearest Coast Guard unit and learn how to make boating a pleasure through safety. Remember, there is no substitute for preparedness—think safety—act safely and the life you save may be YOURS.

The Governor's visit was an enjoyable affair for all concerned, and the acquaintance of our people with him and his party could result in many benefits. The Governor could see for himself that we have been totally neglected in this vicinity so far as state parks are concerned, even to wayside stops. It should not be hard for our recreation committee to follow through and at least secure some share in state assistance not heretofore had.

The Governor's remarks relative to a new source of revenue in the tourist business, pointing out that each day a tourist's car stayed in a community they left \$20, offers much food for thought and should receive much study by us.

With a retreating timber line, as one lumberman put it, "the logs are getting smaller and smaller," and this being a section not given to farming as farther down the valley, it behooves us to diversify and add new crops for future sustenance. Oregon is in its infancy as a tourist state and we can well aim our efforts toward securing our share of this future business.

Acquaintance accomplishes many desired benefits. When people get to know each other and find each to be better than they thought, they go all out to help each other. That is only one reason every one of us should put in an appearance at and get behind the South Lane County Fair slated for Friday and Saturday of this week. Your Chamber will have a good-will booth there donated to us by Russell Smith of Smith Furniture Co. (Thanks Russell). If you attend you will see a definite need for a better arrangement another year. Sooner or later the matter of securing permanent quarters for it must be gone into, if we are to develop our Agriculture in the way we wish.

Kay Bartels has consented to act as director of Cottage Grove Community Hour, on radio station KSGA, sponsored by our Chamber of Commerce. She is doing this purely as a public service and for the love of her community. This is a big job and we should all give her our help.

Dedication of Cottage Grove Community Hour will be broadcast next Monday night at 7:30. A program of short talks has been set, outlining the objects of the program, with as much music as time permits. It is our intention to make this and future programs so interesting that radio fans will watch for it. It will carry no commercial advertising of any nature. Be sure to tune it in.

Mr. Harry A. Lintz, manager of Pacific Northwest District of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, made a short but informative call at the office Tuesday.
