The Church Does Make A Difference

Last week we presented some scriptures which show that the church does make a difference in religion. We continue with the same subject.

1. Jesus is the head of the church.

"And He is the head of the body, the church; who is the beginning, the first-born from the dead; that in all things he might have the preeminence." Col. 1:18. The church is important because Christ is the head of it. But Christ is only the head of the church which He purchased with His blood. Then the church of which one is a member does make a difference.

2. The church is the body of Christ.

"And hath put all things under His feet and gave Him to be the head over all things to the church, which is His body, the fullness of Him that filleth all in all." Eph. 1:22-23. Paul says the church is the body of Christ. This is said only of the church which Christ established for He has but one body. The church, then, does make a difference.

3. All spiritual blessings are in the church.

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ." Eph. 1:3. To be in the church is to be in Christ. Paul says, "The church growth unto an holy temple in the Lord." Eph. 2:21. Then to be in Christ is to be in the church in which all spiritual blessings are found. The church does make a difference.

4. Jesus said all others would be rooted up.

"But He answered and said, every plant which My Heavenly Father hath not planted shall be rooted up." Matthew 15:13. This is why we urge men and women to spurn the thought that the church does not make a difference.

Belgian Congo Missionary to Talk At Baptist Church

Rev. Philip Uhlinger, a missionary to the Belgian Congo, Africa, will speak at the First Baptist Church Thursday evening, January 14, at 7:30 p.m. He will tell of the recent revivals and great changes that are taking place in Africa.

Mr. Uhlinger, the son of missionary parents, was born in the Belgian Congo, and having lived there for 16 years, he speaks the Swahili language fluently. He was baptized at 12 years of age and joined the Belgian Church on the mission field. Writing of this field in 1952, Mr. Uhlinger said, "This area is still deep in the age of superstition, fetishes and witch doctors. But gradually Christianity is getting a foothold and as we develop Christian Congolese leaders to work in the villages and regional posts, it will really begin to reach the people."

A graduate of Westmont College in Santa Barbara, California, he has also a B.D. degree from Berkeley Baptist Divinity School and has done special studies at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York. He and Mrs. Uhlinger first sailed for the Congo in 1948 under the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society.

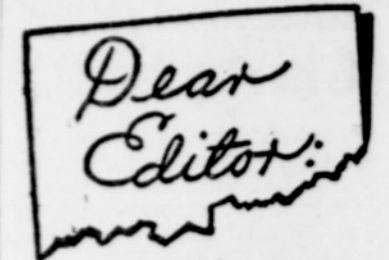

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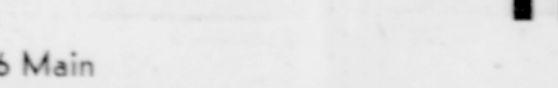

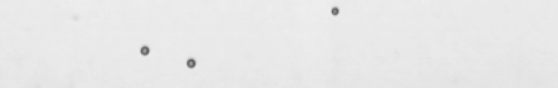
