In announcing as a candidate for governor, Mr. Patterson said, "I shall earnestly strive to provide the enthusiastic leadership necessary to realize good government, greater industrial development, keep our lumber industry strong, efforts to reduce seasonal employment, develop agricultural production, reorganization of state administrative departments and the initiative of far sighted planning."
