

## Rod and Gun Club Starts New Shoots

Beginning January 10 the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club will start a series of small program shoots, with the grounds open at 10:30 a.m.

A 50-target event will start at 1 p.m., and a good variety of merchandise shoots will follow.

Plans have been made to include an extra purse in the 50-target handicap. This will be new to most of the local shooters. The club will start the purse and at each event the shooters will add to it. High gun each event will get one point and an extra two-yard handicap. When it is won twice, by the same shooter, he will win, and another purse will be started. The

purse will probably contain several hundred dollars before it is won. This program has been named the Hileman Handicap, and winners will be announced after each event.

On January 24 the club plans a March of Dimes benefit shoot. Details of this shoot will be announced later.

## Lion Basketball Mentor Picks OSC As Top Team in ND; Eugene in Prep

"Who would I rather have on my team if I had a choice between Halbrook and Johnny O'Brien?" queried Ken Hunt, Cottage Grove basketball coach. "I think I'd pick Halbrook," said the former U of O hoop star. Five foot eleven Hunt, who played somewhat the same style of ball as Johnny O., quickly added that he respected a man like O'Brien, and thought he might be a little better all-around ball player, but believed Halbrook could get more points... "and that's what wins ball games," he said. (Wonder how Ken would have answered this question if he were 6'11"?)

Hunt picks Oregon State definitely as the "team to beat" in the ND hoop race. As for Oregon, the outlook isn't so bright... "but they'll still be tough to beat," thinks CG's B-ball mentor. Oregon's fast break is a tough nut to crack, Ken feels.

On the subject of fast breaks and a fast moving ball club, Hunt thinks it takes fire to fight fire. "The best way to beat that type of ball club is to run with them," Hunt remarked.

"Most Valuable Player" Born and raised in Coos Bay, Hunt was a three-year letterman for the Pirates, being on the starting five for 2½ years there. Ken was named as the most improved basketball player his sophomore year, and was co-holder of the most valuable player award his senior year. This performance was repeated in college when Ken lettered three years and was given the most valuable player award his senior year.

Before coming to CG, Hunt spent his first year after graduation as assistant frosh basketball coach for his alma mater. Ken has a fair start on his own basketball team with one boy and another on the way.

On the prep level, Hunt thinks Eugene high has the edge as "the team to beat," with Corvallis and Albany in strong contention. Coos Bay's recent victories over Eugene, Corvallis and strong Central Catholic were as much a surprise to the ex-pirate as they were to everyone else, but he still holds out for Eugene as top dog.

On the question of Eastern superiority on the basketball court, Hunt is a bit uncertain. "They have a different type of offense," remarked Hunt, "and any edge they might have over the western states is primarily due to early training and an intensive summer basketball program."

Ken is definitely the outdoor type, as his favorite hobbies involve being outside. They're a bit on the domestic side, however, for he doesn't especially like to hunt or fish, but merely work around the yard, do a bit of gardening and push the lawn mower around.

High Year Score Speaking of push, Hunt was deadly on the one-hand push shot at the U. of O. He used the two-handed push shot in high school and somewhat during college, but it was principally because of the one-hander that he became the first man in the Northern Division under six feet to score over 200 points in one year. "The one-hander is a quicker shot and easier to get away," says Ken. For more accuracy on the free throw line, however, Hunt feels the two-hander is best for the more uncoordinated ball player. "It's more relaxing and requires less effort," he says.

Ken hopes to someday become a college basketball mentor or work on the administrative level.

## Pink Salmon Seen In Oregon Waters

A comparative stranger to Oregon waters has put in an appearance lately on at least two coastal streams. Reports of pink salmon, though not unheard of before, are rare. These are the salmon that make a great part of the commercial catch in the streams of Alaska and northern British Columbia and normally are not found in Oregon streams though they do pass the coast during their migrations.

One pink was caught above tide-water in the Sixes river and three others were observed on a spawning redd in Beaver creek, which is a tributary of the Nestucca river.
