Storm Sewers

the number of streets in a drainage district, would be from one-half cent to one cent per square foot. At one cent per square foot, the cost for a lot 100 by 100 feet would be \$100.

The engineers recommended to the Council that the city take the following steps in planning the storm sewer system: 1. Adopt the ultimate development plan as a basis for future storm sewer construction. 2. Establish the limits of immediate sewer construction, using information in the prepared report. 3. Adopt a financing program consistent with the limits of proposed construction. 4. Prepare detailed plans and specifications in advance. And 5. Undertake a program to familiarize the citizens of the city with the proposed program. Copies of the report were distributed to Council members.

Roderick was also able to help Council members with the storm sewer problem in addition to the report. He told them of available 42-inch pipe for a storm sewer that the City of Albany found not usable for the sanitary sewer they had purchased it for, but more than adequate for a storm sewer. Nearly 2,000 feet of pipe, are available, for less than half the actual cost. Council voted to purchase the pipe, which will be laid from Thayer Street to East Main. Councilman H. B. McMillan pointed out that this will be the initial start to drain the Eighth street area between Taylor and Monroe.

Councilmen also settled other items of business at the Monday session. They moved and passed that the City Attorney prepare the proposed liquor ordinance of the League of Oregon Cities for adoption at a later date.

New State Highway
Councilmen discussed the proposal of the Oregon State Highway commission to run the new highway through the southeast corner of town. The commission proposed to build the super highway through the intersections of

Taylor and Glass at 13th. Road would cut through Glass Road, high school property and private property along Glass, Taylor and Park Lane. Council authorized the city recorder to write the commission stating that the City Council of Cottage Grove preferred that the highway be constructed outside of the city.

The Council discussed at length the problems of the rough SP railroad crossings at Main, Sixth, Fourth and Monroe. They authorized the City Attorney to write to the Public Utilities Commission informing them of the matter.

Members heard a letter from the League of Oregon Cities regarding the financing of their Po-

lice Schools. Inasmuch as state funds have run out, and the Legislature does not meet until 1955, the League requested that cities participating in the schools contribute \$25 per year for its support. Police Chief Ed Jones told Councilmen that three of the CG Force members—Officers Hangerford, Huffman and Hansen were attending the school now in session. Council voted to send \$25 to the League.

Council adjourned about 11 p.m. It will meet Monday at 8 p.m. in the City Hall.
