Citizens Vote 92-82 to Stay In Rural School District 40

CRESWELL.—One hundred seventy-four voters cast their ballots at the Creswell grade school Monday evening to decide whether or not School District 40 would withdraw from the Lane County Rural School District. The final count showed 92 in favor of remaining in the rural district. There were 82 votes for withdrawal.

The election is final, according to state law, and the district will remain in the rural school board from now on.

Several days earlier at the mass meeting of patrons of the Creswell Elementary School District No. 40 held at the Creswell School January 12, James Turnbull of the state office of public instruction in Salem assisted by Mrs. Lucille Klinge, Lane County School Superintendent and Attorney John Luvaas of Eugene, explained the status of the district, which listed more than 1000 children in the recent school census. This made the district eligible to withdraw from the rural district set up, and become affiliated as a first class district.

During the past three years, taxpayers of the district have paid \$17,000 more in school taxes than the district has received under the county school tax equalization, Luvaas said. He also stated that an element of gamble entered in no matter which way the patrons voted.

If tax valuations of the district continues at the present levels or increase beyond the average of other county school districts the Creswell voters would probably gain by forming their own first class district.

But, if the valuation should decrease in the future, the district would then be better off to remain in the rural district.

The discussion warmed up considerably when voters from the Walker area talked about what it would do to them if the Creswell District 40 and the Creswell Union high school district unified. If such a thing should happen those in the Walker area who already belong to District 40, and are also taxpayers in the Cottage Grove Union high school district would at the same time be obligated for bonded indebtedness in the Creswell Union high school district. They would then be taxed in two districts. E. D. Grousbek, chairman of the grade school board, presided at the meeting.

In a letter sent to the parents of the school pupils, Ralph Train, superintendent of the local elementary schools, pointed out that "there are so many possibilities, uncertainties and implications involved in the whole situation that it was hard to tell whether School District 40 should vote to stay in or get out of the rural district. The laws could change, the valuations could change and unification with Creswell Union high school District 12 could be possible."

Commander Crisp Urges Americans Fight Communism

CRESWELL.—A suggestion that the people of the United States can avert further encroachment of their liberties by Communism, by revitalizing their own belief in Americanism, is made here this week by R. W. Crisp, Commander of the Creswell Post No. 4039, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

The recommendation to get back to the principles and ideals upon which America was founded to rid the nation of Communism and other foreign ideologies is made in connection with National VFW week, January 24-30. The local overseas group expects to participate by formulating these plans to increase its membership and community activities.

"We in the VFW," Commander Crisp asserts, "believe that a stepped up program in the homes and schools everywhere to teach our children the fundamental principles of democracy and Americanism, can avert further encroachment of our liberties with Godless Communism."

"We state that this organization has long advocated ridding the nation of all card-carrying Reds and their fellow travelers."
