Fish to Be Planted Near Walterville

A recent agreement by the Eugene Water and Electric Board and the Oregon State Game Commission promises to create some new fishing waters for sportsmen of the area.

In a letter to the game commission, the Eugene board stated that it had no objections to the commission planting fish in the pool created by the pumped storage facility near Walterville.

The board continued that it also had no objection to public use of the reservoir shore line for bank fishing, with the exception of a small restricted area adjacent to the control works. Restrictions were placed on the use of this area because it was felt that it would endanger lives to have people using this area where high voltage electricity is present. This closure would be posted and barricaded.

Chris Jensen, game commission biologist, made arrangements with the board and in granting the use of the waters, they expressed their pleasure in cooperating to more effectively utilize the reservoir in the furtherance of the public benefit.

The reservoir will be planted with legal-sized fish before the opening of trout season this year.
