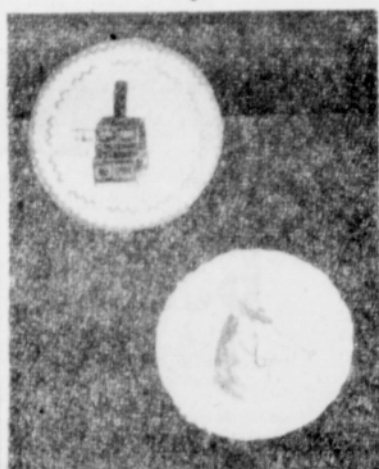

The bride wore a gray suit with red accessories. She graduated from the local high school with the class of '52. The bridegroom has just recently been discharged from the Army after three years in service.

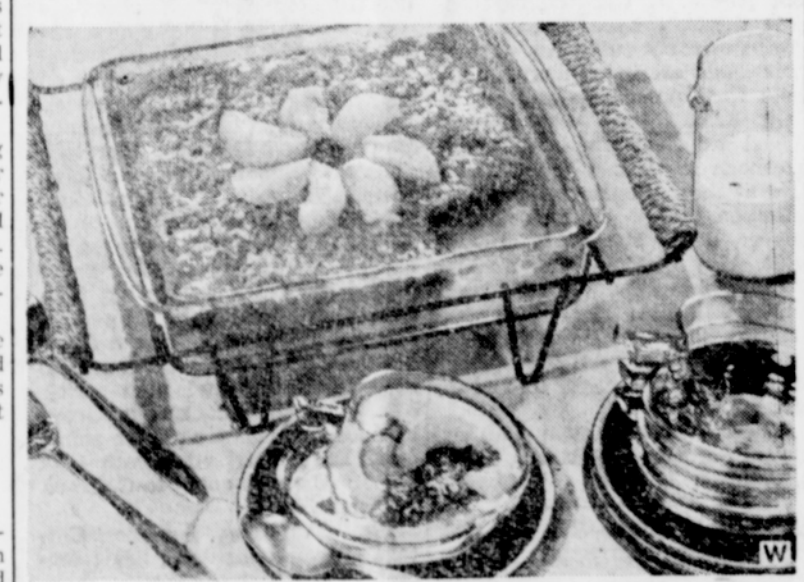
Surprise Shower Honors Delight Valley Matron

Apple Crisp Makes Good Winter Dish

Apple Crisp
2½ cups (1 can) sliced apples
1 tablespoon lemon juice
¾ cup all-purpose flour
¾ cup brown sugar
¼ teaspoon salt
¾ teaspoon cinnamon
6 tablespoons butter
Place apples in 9"x9"x2" pan, reserving several for garnish; sprinkle with lemon juice. Combine flour, brown sugar, salt and cinnamon. Cut in butter with two knives or pastry blender. Sprinkle on apples. Garnish with remaining apple slices and maraschino cherry. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375° F., 30 minutes, or until crumbs are light brown. Serve hot or cold with or without cream. Yields 6 servings.

Theme for the conference will be "The Business Community's Stake in Education."

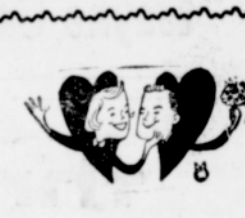
