Creswell Phone Co. Plans Extension Of Phone System

CRESWELL—In spite of the bad weather some fifty patrons of the Creswell Consolidated Telephone company were present at the annual meeting at the Creswell Grange hall. Carlyle Scarbrough, president, presided and opened the meeting with a resume of work accomplished during the past year including contacts that had been made with other companies to get ideas how the local set-up could be improved.

Serves 330 Patrons
He also stated that the company was in better financial condition than it ever had been. The mortgage had been paid off and the company was in debt to no one. Several lines had been installed. There were 330 patrons and there was a long list of applications for service that could not be granted at this time due to lack of finances. As things are now the directors could not promise much expansion for some time.

The matter of borrowing money to enlarge the system and give service to those requesting was opened for discussion. Fred E. McGrady of Seattle, representative of the Stromberg-Carlson Manufacturing Company of New York gave a brief history of telephone financing and explained the long time and short time loans, also how the dial system would work in this area.

To Borrow \$60,000
More discussion followed. A motion was then made and adopted to grant the directors of the Creswell Consolidated Telephone Company the power to borrow up to \$60,000 for the proposed projects. Carlyle Scarbrough was reelected director for three years to serve inside the city of Creswell. W. C. Adams, who had served one year of his three year term as director of the south area but who had recently moved to Creswell, resigned as representative of the south district and was elected director for one year to serve in the city to fill the unexpired term of E. J. Greenwood.
