Grade School Upsets Hi School 24-22 In Donkey Basketball; \$233.50 for Pool

Phil "Slim" Higdon lead the area grade school team to an overtime victory in February 4's donkey basketball game at the CG high school gym. Final score was 24-22 in favor of the grade schoolers over the Cottage Grove high school squad. Higdon, playing spirited game, pulled his team from behind in the fourth quarter of play to tie the score 22-22 at game time, necessitating an overtime. More than 1,000 spectators witnessed the spectacular ball game, and a total of \$233.50 profit was made for the swimming pool fund.

High school coach [Bob "Pop" Dusenberry and his men waged a never-ending battle in an attempt to subdue their rivals, but Coach Bill "Point a Year" Oglesby's men, spurred by the dauntless Higdon, were not to be beaten.

Higdon, high point man for the evening, poured 12 shots points through the hoop.

It was hard to single out players for special praise. However, many spectators were quick to comment on the work of Wally "Latin Lover" Ciochetti in handling his donkey. Several times during the evening Ciochetti found it necessary to push, pull or drag his steed in the direction of the correct basket. Most of his time was spent in ground play.

There were a few moments of worry concerning the condition of Orley "Shorty" Kingzett who seemed to be injured during the third quarter of play. However, after quick work by a teammate in placing a pillow in the correct spot, "Shorty" mounted his donkey quickly.

Only one casualty occurred during the game. Early in the first quarter, Lou "Swede" Iacarella of the high school squad was taken from the floor following a spill from his donkey. Iacarella suffered a sprained ankle.

There was some talk from high school fans concerning the assist given Higdon by an unidentified grade school student in the final second of overtime. The student, picking up the basketball, returned it directly to Higdon, who then made the winning basket.

However, grade school fans countered with comments concerning the high school's sending in all substitutes in the closing minutes of the game.

Fans decided there would be some mighty stiff and sore instructors the next morning. The Sentinel heard, from completely unreliable sources, that a majority of the team members carried pillows to class with them the following morning.

Recent Snows Cause Pheasant Pen Worry

Clearing skies in western Oregon is welcome news for the Oregon game commission in the Corvallis area.

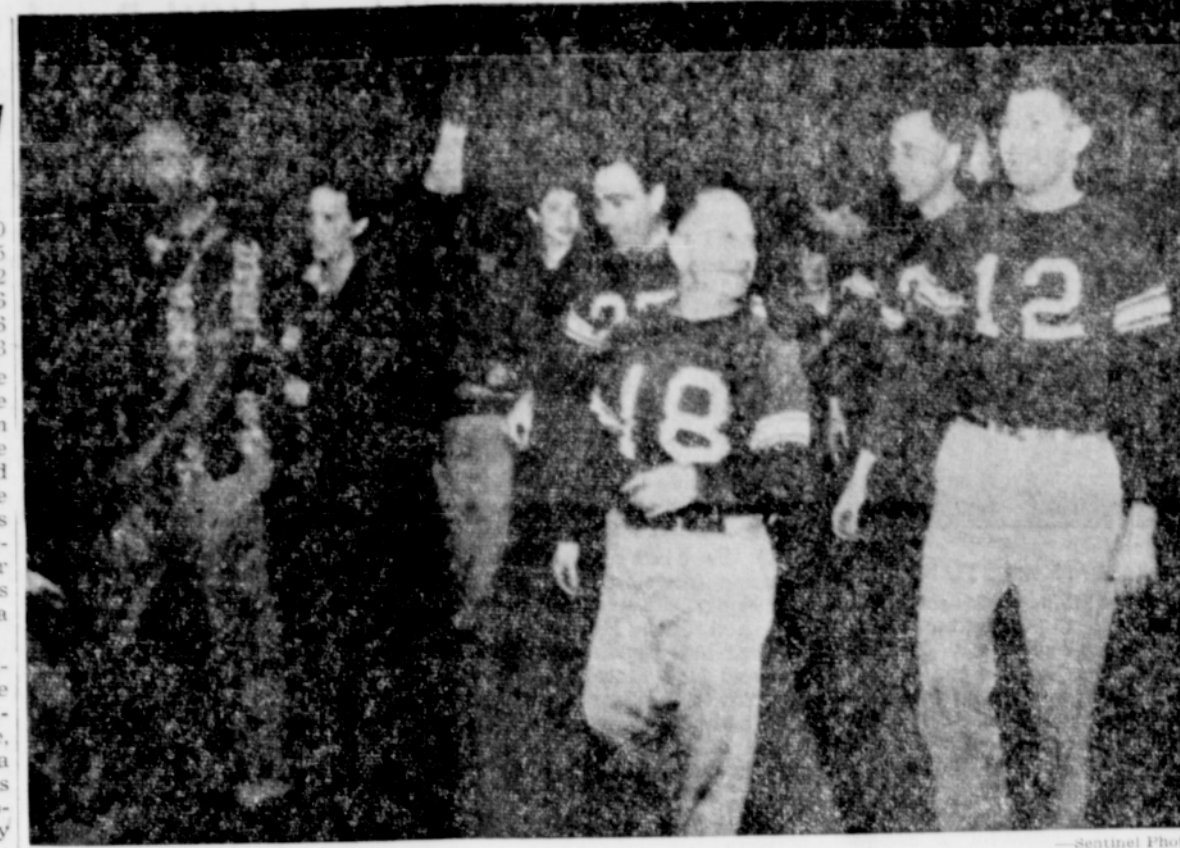
All hands were called for night sessions of snow-shaking at the E. E. Wilson management area during the recent snows. The wet, heavy flakes of white stuff were too big to sift through the wire mesh covering the pheasant raising pens, and as it piled up, the weight threatened to collapse the pens.

Unfortunately, the heaviest snows occurred at night, thus adding to the problems and making the protective measures more difficult. Members of the game farm crew carried the brunt of the duties, and it was only through their efforts and alertness that considerable damage to the pens was avoided. They were aided in their work by other game commission employees in the area from as far away as Albany and Corvallis, and members of the Oregon Cooperative Wildlife Research unit.

Even with the efforts of the men at shaking snow off the wire, one portion of the pens holding brood pheasants collapsed and a few adult birds escaped before they could be herded into the adjacent intact enclosure.

Damage sustained will not affect the pheasant production of the farm for the coming year.
