Teacher Career Week

March 28 to April 3 is "Teacher Career Week," set aside by the Oregon Educational Association to stress the need for 17,000 additional teachers in the state within the next ten years. The public is urged to focus attention of desirable young people on the need of teachers and the opportunities of the teaching profession.

Resident births in the state increased from 13,468 in 1930 to 39,900 in 1953. The infant population has tripled and a tremendous growth is contemplated for the next ten years. Public school attendance is expected to increase from about 290,000 pupils to slightly under 500,000.

The association says the state needs about 1,500 new teachers each year, half of this number to keep up with the growing school enrollment and half to replace teachers retiring. Only about half the teachers needed are being trained in Oregon teacher training schools.

New teachers must be found, if the public schools are to operate. In connection with this week, the Oregon Education Association at 1530 S. W. Taylor St., Portland 5, Oregon has all the background material needed to solve the teacher shortage, if public opinion can be aroused as to the need.

commissioner. S. Eugene Allen of Portland, H. E. Barker of Salem, both republicans and Norman O. Nilsen, a democrat of Portland.

Four are candidates for state senator, third district with two to be nominated. Republicans are Truman Chase and Don Husband, present senators from Eugene. The two democrats are from Eugene, Clarence Hyde and Kietli Skelton.

Sixteen candidates had filed for the office of state representative, 14th district, but it was understood Saturday that Otis Ritter, local man had asked to withdraw.

Republicans for this office include: Loran Stewart, present representative, Ernest Schrenk of Creswell, Earl Hill of Cushman, Day Bayly, Roger Barwell, Ed Cone, V. Ed Johnson and George Owen, all of Eugene, William Cash of Oakridge and Elmer Maxey of Springfield. Democrats filed for the legislature include: A. C. Wakefield of Cottage Grove, Florence R. Cook and Donald F. Ellison, both of Eugene, Richard Eymann of Mohawk and E. J. Evans of Springfield.

County Offices Opposed

With exception of the district attorney, all county offices have both republican and democratic candidates. For county assessor: George Stock, present assessor and Louis H. Jensen, both republicans of Eugene and W. W. Smith of Creswell, a democratic candidate.

For county treasurer: Grace Schiska, present treasurer and J. Alfred Person, both republicans; Olga Freeman and Ina Randolph, both of Eugene are the democratic candidates.

For district attorney there is no candidate from the democratic party. Republicans are Cecil Stickley and Eugene Venn, both of Eugene.

There are ten candidates for the county commissioner's job with two to be elected. Republican candidates, Robert D. Brown, Ralph Fosnaugh, Glenn J. Hought, Robert D. Maclay and Kenneth Nielsen (present commissioner) and Charles O. Marston, all of Eugene, and Lee Raish of Springfield. Democratic candidates include a former resident, Frank Bradford, also Joseph S. Ayers and Robert W. Staub, both of Springfield.

Three names appear on the non-partisan ballot for the Cottage Grove justice district: John Wells, incumbent, Wolff Allen and Forrest M. Woods. This is the largest number of seekers for this office we can remember.

Ritter Withdraws
Otis Ritter, candidate for state representative on the republican ticket, has withdrawn from the race, it was learned Tuesday. In quitting the race, Mr. Ritter said he lacked adequate finances to make the campaign and maintain himself in the legislature.

about such an idea and he will talk to a representative of the State Highway Department later this week, concerning possibility of installation, costs, etc. The letters were turned over to Councilman Bricher for a proposed recommendation at the next meeting.

Council heard a report from the Mayor concerning the matter of an equitable price agreement with the bridge contractors of Wall, Bartram and Sanford for allowing continuous one-way traffic over the Coast Fork of the Willamette where the new bridge is being constructed. Council and the contractors agreed to a price of \$1,500 which cancels the previous agreement of \$2,000 for the continuous traffic. The city will provide traffic lights when the time for one-way traffic arrives.

Paving on Pennoyer
A petition from property owners on Pennoyer Street was read by the council. It called for paving on Pennoyer from the easterly right-of-way boundary of 99 to Eleventh. Council accepted the petition.

Council members heard and accepted Ordinance 1445 which called for the placing on the ballot for the May 21, 1954, primary election, a charter amendment which allows the maximum fine for drunkenness to be raised from \$100 to \$500 and allows for a jail sentence not to exceed six months or both. They also heard and accepted Ordinance 1446 calling for the improving of Quincy street from the east boundary of First street to the east boundary of Third street.

Councilmen Zack Coop and Jess Hill were authorized by the Mayor to represent the city body at a special meeting with the South Lane Fair Board tonight in the Council Chambers.

Closing business was a report by H. B. McMillan, general foreman of the street department, concerning need for transportation and new calculator. The matters were turned over to Councilmen Bricher and Coop.

The Council will meet this coming Monday at 8 p.m.

Two CG FFA Boys To Attend Meet

Representatives from the 83 Future Farmers of America clubs in Oregon will meet at Oregon State College March 16-19 for the annual FFA convention. There will be two representatives from each club present along with chapter advisors. David Moss and Malcolm Clark will represent the CG high school club. David is chapter secretary, and Malcolm is chapter executive secretary.

Local club advisor Bob Wright said the main purpose of the convention is to gather information to help organize local activities for the coming year. Also during the convention there will be contests in parliamentary procedure and public speaking.

At the close of the convention the state award (degree) will be presented to two percent of the boys attending who are outstanding in FFA work. Last year Joel Pynch of the local chapter received one of the awards.

The two Grove delegates were chosen because of their outstanding work in FFA and school activities. David has 2,000 laying hens and Malcolm has two beef heifers and one beef steer.

Sen. John F. Kennedy Heads April 2 Rally Of Demos in Springfield

United States Senator John F. Kennedy, (Dem., Mass.), will speak at a Democratic party rally in Lane county and the Fourth Congressional district to be held April 2, in Springfield at the Memorial Building.

The dinner will kick-off the primary campaign of Richard L. Neuberger, Demo. candidate for the Senate, and Charles O. Porter, Demo. candidate for Congress.

The rally is jointly sponsored by the State Democratic party, and the counties comprising the Fourth Congressional district.

Senator Kennedy is the son of Joseph Kennedy, former ambassador to Great Britain. He was elected to the Senate in 1952.

Al Wakefield Candidate for State House Representatives



Al Wakefield of 1374 Ostrander Lane, Cottage Grove, is another local candidate for the state house of representatives on the democratic ticket.

Services were held at the Monmouth Christian Church March 13, with burial in Rest Lawn Memorial Gardens, west of Salem.
