## Japan Missionary To Speak April 5 Lutheran Church

On Monday, April 5, the people of Cottage Grove will be privileged to welcome a missionary to both China and Japan, at the Trinity Lutheran Church. At 7:30 p.m. on that evening, the Rev. Paul Kreyling, Lutheran missionary now stationed in Japan, will present a program of slides, lectures, and discussion about the work which he has been doing in the Orient. And it is a highly interesting story.

In September, 1946, missionary Kreyling sailed with a group of other missionaries for China, and was immediately assigned to Hankow for language studies. The following year he was assigned to do student work in Wuchang, the "University City" across the Yangtze River from Hankow. At the same time he was also appointed Far Eastern Representative of the International Lutheran Hour, and it was this latter work which brought the Kreyling's to Shanghai in January, 1949.

Rev. Kreyling carried on the mission work in Shanghai and was also tutoring a Chinese theological student. After the communists captured Shanghai, and gradually clamped restrictions on the mission work, the Kreylings decided to leave China, and were able to get on the only passenger ship permitted to enter Shanghai since the communists took over that city.

**Go To Japan in 1949**

They sailed from Shanghai in September, 1949, intending to return to America. But when they saw the mission opportunities in Japan during a 6-hour stopover, they decided to stay in Japan as missionaries. In November of 1949 Kreyling began work in Hankow, a community just west of Tokyo, and the following year in Urawa, just north of Tokyo. The work in Hankow led to the gift to the mission of a Junior and Senior High school there by an elderly Japanese educator who had founded this private school some 50 years before, and Rev. Kreyling served as principal, rehabilitating the school, faculty and facilities, until the spring of 1953.

Pastor Kreyling is now completing a four-month tour of the Pacific Coast, and will return to his family in New York. He was married to Miss Carol Suttmeier of Richmond Hill, N. Y., in the chapel of Concordia Seminary, Hankow, China, in May, 1948, and they now have three sons, Peter, 4, born in Shanghai; and Stephen, 3, and Thomas, 1, born in Tokyo. They returned to the U.S. in May, 1953, for a year's furlough, and will again go to Japan in June.

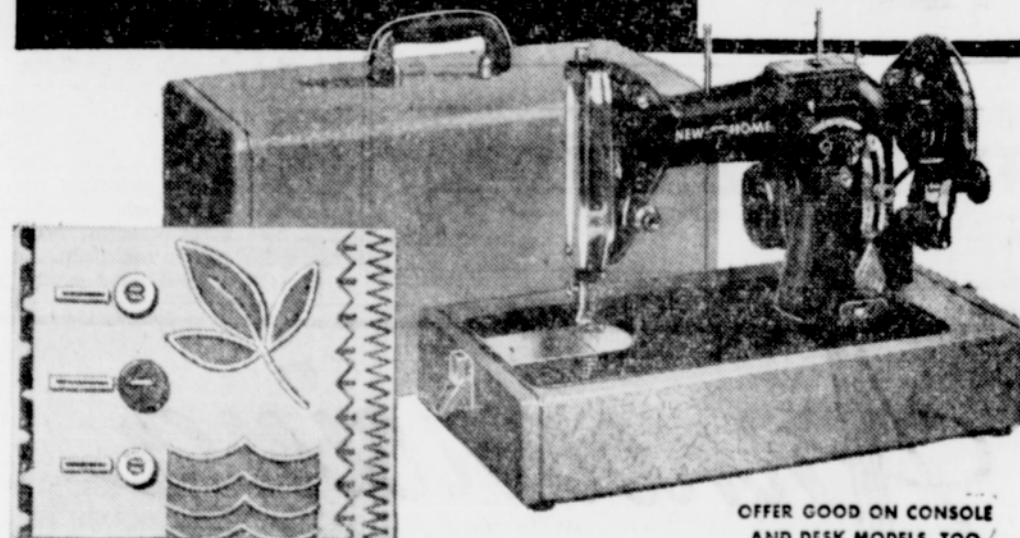
