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Ken Hunt Resigns For Salem Post

The resignation of Cottage Grove Union high school basketball coach Ken Hunt was announced Monday by Superintendent Virgil Kingsley. Hunt resigned to accept the position as head basketball coach at the Northside high school in Salem, Oregon. His resignation at the local school becomes effective at the end of this school year.

Hunt came to Cottage Grove last fall. He told The Sentinel earlier this week that he hated to leave, but the opportunity offered him in Salem could not be passed up. He and his wife and two children will leave Cottage Grove in the middle of June. In addition to the problem of packing, etc., he is faced with the matter of selling his home on South Tenth Street.

The school in Salem is a three-year high school and has an enrollment of 1,150.

Kingsley said that many applications for the coaching position at CG high had been coming in. He hopes to have a new coach chosen within the next two or three weeks.

would be impossible since law requires such issues be on the ballot 65 days prior to the election. He also added that such a purchase might call for a charter revision.

Mayor Joe Crepeau authorized the Council committee composed of Joe Bricher, Jess Hill and Gil Gardner, who is chairman, to meet again with the Chamber Hagen and also Chamber president Young and Chamber Manager Chick Hiltbrand.

Present at the Council meeting were members of the Off-Street Parking committee, C. C. Morelock, W. C. Martin and Chairman Hagen and also Chamber president Young and Chamber Manager Chick Hiltbrand.

Council members discussed in detail the matter of paving in the Oak Park addition and the paving of "M" street leading to the addition with Maynard Wilson, Earl Wilson and R. B. Hill. Council requested that the men return to the Council again when they have the assessed valuation determined and have a little more accurate idea of what the cost would be for the paving. The paving matter was tabled until further word from Maynard or Earl Wilson and City Engineer Les Coiner.

Low-Cost Housing

Next item of business concerned the matter of possible low-cost, FFA-approved housing being built in or near Cottage Grove by the Slavens Bros. Construction Company of Eugene. Council heard from Chamber Manager Hiltbrand who told them of a request from the construction firm concerning width of street paving under the width set by the city. Council gave no official answer to the question at the meeting.

Mayor Crepeau turned over to City Engineer Coiner the matter of securing help from the State Highway Department for paving of portions of North and South River Roads after he had read Council a letter from the department which stated that all available help funds to city under 5,000 population had been utilized for this current year. The Highway department suggested that the Council apply for '55 funds.

After some discussion concerning the tearing down of the Elmer Kent building, Council authorized the City Engineer to take the necessary steps to dismantle the building.

The City Council members also talked about the new bridge and the matter of grading, new approaches and new sidewalks around the bridge.

Council heard a request from General Foreman H. B. McMillan requesting that a phone be put in the City Shop on West Main for the sake of insuring quicker repair work, etc. Request was granted.

New Ordinances Passed

Council also passed three new ordinances near the close of the Monday meeting. Ordinance 1447 made official the position of Assistant to the City Engineer and General Foreman. Ordinance 1448 concerned paving on North Tenth from the South line of Villard Court to the North line of Grover Avenue. Ordinance 1449 dealt with paving on Penoyer Street from the East rightaway of the boundary of Highway 99 to the West boundary of Eleventh Avenue.

Mayor Crepeau read the the Council and others present an invitation from the League of Oregon Cities to attend a meeting and dinner for people in city government April 8 in Eugene. He urged all who could to attend.

Council adjourned then until next Monday night when members hoped to resume their budget discussion.

Lions Win Second In the Willamette Relays Saturday

The Cottage Grove Lions won second place in the Willamette relays at Salem Saturday with a score of 38. Salem won first with 35, followed by Cottage Grove with 38. Beaverton 36 5/16 and Redmond with 36. Had the Lions entered more individual events, the relay results would have been much closer.

In the 120 yard high hurdles, Jack Murry took first in the 9th heat with a time of 17.5. Dean Cramer took 1st in the 440 yard dash in the first heat with a time of 55.9. Dick Kretten of Creswell took first in the same event running in the second heat. His time 53.8, the best time made.

In the distance medley, the Lions took second in the first heat. In

the second heat, a team composed of Jim Patten, Larry Stanley, Charles Coston and Jim Bridges took first with a time of 11.44.

In the sprint relay, the Grovers took second. Jim Wilson tied for second place in the pole vault. In the 480 yard shuttle hurdle relay, Cottage Grove took fifth place with a time of 11.1. The team was composed of Dick Heath, Jay Wilson, Leroy Cothrell and Jack Murry.

In the college division, the points were well divided. The University of Oregon track squad won its share of honors despite the fact that three key distance men, Doug Clement, Bill Dillinger and Al Martin were out of the lineup on account of injuries. The novice class of the javelin was won by Doyle Higon of Cottage Grove with a distance of 187.2. The Oregon frosh were especially strong, winning first in most of the events.

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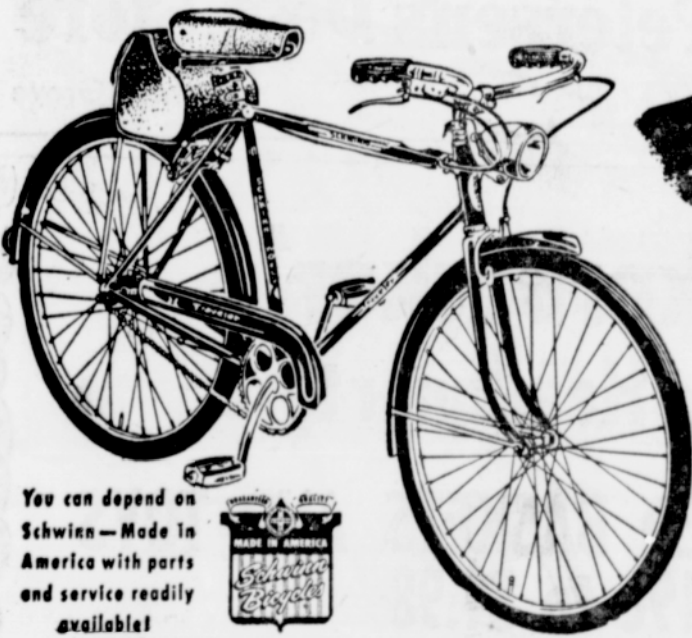
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
