viciously believed.

She also pointed out that perhaps more volunteers would now serve in a Skywatch program locally since the recent bomb experiments had made people more defense conscious.

Dr. Gutman, through a series of cards representing the various phases of civilian defense that were read by club members, pointed out the state structure. "We do not put our detailed plans into operation until an emergency comes, but it has been the history of our country that we go into effective operation provided the plan is there," she said.

Professional Groups

The services on the state level pointed out were made up mostly of professional groups which are already trained for a job. These included fire, medical aid and welfare, engineer, transportation, communications, and the cooperating agencies of the military and air civil defense, the latter being represented by the Ground Observer Corps.

Dr. Gutman pointed out that the community plan consisted of a local civilian defense agency, active community clubs, a strong church organization and democratic government.

At the individual level the physician pointed out that the person should be informed, qualified and prepared to act. She suggested that anyone who had not taken a modern First Aid course should do so.

Family Unit

Dr. Gutman also pointed out that the family unit was important in civil defense in providing a safe home, adequate food supply and religious faith.
