'Jesus Christ, the Truth, the Life, The Way' Theme 2-Day Meeting

"Jesus Christ, the Truth, the Life, the Way" was the theme of the two-day annual Eugene District conference of the Woman's Society of Christian Service held in the local Methodist Church Thursday and Friday which attracted approximately 150 women from the district. Many outstanding speakers were heard during the two days and special music was provided by local talent. The sessions opened with an executive meeting Thursday afternoon. A banquet was served Thursday evening in Friendship hall by members of the Woman's Society.

Mrs. E. E. Cone, Eugene, vice president, presided over the evening meeting and introduced the speakers, district officers and sub-district officers. Vocal selections were rendered by the high school girls' Triple Trio, accompanied by Millard Kinnery, vocal instructor at the high school and director of the Methodist choir. They sang "When Children Pray," "While We're Young" and "Down by the Riverside."

Mrs. Frank Brown of Grants Pass, Secretary of Youth Work of the Oregon conference, brought the evening message on "Our Responsibility to Our Youth." She stressed that young people need faith, "a faith in someone bigger than himself, a faith in a cause he believes worth living for, faith in himself, his friends and in God. He needs a companion as he walks the way, and in God, he finds a friend constant and dependable. He needs good parents who will help him to achieve a deep faith, a faith that is vital, faith that will prepare him to face not only the best in life but also the worst." She stressed the great responsibility of church adults toward the youth, who were born in a depression, grew to adolescence amid the sufferings and anxieties of World War II, and in later years surrounded by the instabilities and threats of a cold war which, for them, may at any moment suddenly become hot.

The evening closed with an inspirational and enlightening meditation by Mrs. Wayne Stauffer of Eugene.

The Friday session opened at 9:30 a.m. with a worship service by the Rev. Sydney Gaither, pastor of the local church, followed by the welcome by Mrs. John Long, president of the Cottage Grove WSCS, and response by Mrs. J. N. Bestul, Grants Pass, president of the district organization. She also presided over the Friday meetings.

As she told of the many touching incidents from these missionaries, she placed a red heart on their country and a red satin ribbon leading to Oregon, and at the close of her talk a large red heart was placed over Oregon, leaving the thought that we can take these missionaries in our hearts by our prayers and assist in their many needs.

Missionary Work Basis of Peace
Mrs. J. W. Bunch of Forest Grove, chairman of the standing committee on Spiritual Life of the Woman's Division of Christian Service, presented the closing message on the Board of Missions and work being accomplished by the Church. She said that the Board of Missions is doing a work parallel with that of the United Nations in that it is helping to feed the hungry, clothe those in need, develop leadership and teach the illiterate. She said we cannot have World Peace when so many have so little and others so much and that hungry people are not peaceful. She also stated that the Missionary program is the basis of World Peace and those helping are "punching holes in the darkness around the World."

The two-day conference came to a close with a dedication service for the new officers conducted by Mrs. Tilton.

Dairy Calves Need More Than Pasture

Rushing small dairy calves onto pasture this spring is false economy that results in pot-bellied slow growers that fill up on grass without getting the concentrated feeds needed for good growth.

Dr. I. R. Jones, Oregon State college research dairyman, says the problem hinges to the fact that a calf's rumen at birth has a capacity of only about one-half gallon compared with 30 to 40 gallons in a mature animal.

For best gains, feeding trials show that calves from two to six months of age should receive 3 pounds of calf meal a day and all the hay they will eat while on pasture. The meal should be high in protein, including some animal protein, and provide a source of calcium and phosphorus for bone-building.

From 6 to 10 months, calves on pasture should receive 2 to 3 pounds of grain a day but won't need the hay. After 10 months, the rumen is large enough that animals should grow well on good pasture alone.
