1952 Deer Kill Third Highest In United States

Oregon deer hunters who have been unsuccessful and who may claim that the hunting here doesn't compare with that in many other states will be surprised by a recent report of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The statistics released show that the total deer kill in Oregon in 1952 was the third greatest for any state in the United States. Michigan with a kill of 162,120 deer led the nation and was followed by Utah with a kill of 90,161 deer. Oregon placed third with 78,170 deer killed.

In total number of big game animals of all species killed, Oregon ranked fourth, being surpassed by the two previously mentioned states and Wyoming, Wyoming has a large kill of all varieties and leads the nation in number of antelope harvested.

Considering elk alone, Oregon again ranks fourth in the nation, being surpassed by Idaho, Montana, and Wyoming in that order. A comparison of the number of big animals killed with hunting license sales, shows that approximately 14 per cent of the license holders in Michigan were successful. In Oregon, for the same year, approximately 30 per cent of the hunting license holders bagged big game animals. Utah and Wyoming hunters were slightly over 61 per cent successful.

Though the deer kill figures for 1953 have not yet been compiled, indications are that it will exceed the 1952 kill, and all reports show that deer herds are in excellent condition following a favorable winter.
