usable scale of the farm, detailed soil information and later technical assistance. He added that districts aid in solving problems in the area such as laying out of tile systems for drainage, designing of open drainage systems, irrigation, flood control, soil fertility problems, erosion control and woodland management.

County Agent Fletcher followed the line of thought set in Pavel's talk by telling his audience what was to be expected from a Soil Conservation District.

"Everything has to start at the beginning," Fletcher said, as he gave the general description of how large the proposed SCD would be. Tentatively, the area is set to extend from the Douglas county line up to and including the McKenzie River sector and Mohawk Valley. Fletcher said that in drawing up a proposed SCD it is well to put in all possible land.

"The Soil Conservation Commission can always exclude land," he said, "but it can't include new land without calling for the forming of an addition."

"The good thing about an SCD," he continued, "is that all the people work together. The mere creation of the district won't help much. We only get out of something what we put into it—no more, no less."

The Chamber meeting was called to order by CC president Taylor Young, who turned it over to Dr. H. A. Hagen, chairman of the Chamber's agricultural committee. Dr. Hagen told the members present something of the background work of the CC committee towards forming an SCD, before introducing Forrest Woods who introduced Pavel. Woods pointed out that an SCD is not pushed on people, but must come about through their desire to form one.

CC members will have a special guests in their upcoming May general membership meeting Chester Sterrett and Guy Leonard of the Portland Chamber. Sterrett handles the Industrial Development Program for the Portland group, and Leonard is assistant manager of the Rose City Chamber.
