Yellow Fruit Fly Begins to Emerge

The yellow currant fly which affects currants and gooseberries has been to emerge, says W. B. Parker, Lane County extension agent. He urges that anyone interested in having clean fruit apply spray or dust materials at the present time and at seven day intervals between now and harvest.

The fly lays its eggs beneath the skin of the developing fruit soon after it emerges. Once eggs are laid, the infestation cannot be prevented. In addition to the gooseberry (or currant) plants, spray adjoining fence rows, brush, interplanted trees, and other plant materials in which the fly may seek temporary shelter before it returns to the gooseberry plant to lay its eggs.

Lead arsenate or methoxychlor sprays or dusts control this insect.
