Bank Releases Quarterly Figures

Quarterly statement of condition figures released by the Cottage Grove branch of the First National Bank of Portland show that on March 31, 1954, deposits at the branch were \$8,146,172 and loans were \$3,212,899. Announcement of the totals was made by H. E. Eakin, branch manager.

New all-time high figures in deposits, loans and resources were reported for First National Bank of Portland and its 67 statewide banking offices. This is the first regular quarterly statement of condition since First National purchased its 15 affiliated banks with 18 offices throughout Oregon.

As of March 31, deposits at First National and its 67 statewide banking offices totaled \$689,290,616. Loans amounted to \$353,787,562, and resources totaled \$745,883,417.

In releasing the figures, the bank president reported that over March 31, 1953 deposits at First National have increased \$125,925,661, loans have increased \$50,208,880 and resources have increased \$126,539,704. Capital funds on March 31, 1954 were \$44,276,764, which amount will be increased by \$16 million on about April 15 when sale of an additional 400,000 shares of stock is completed.

ANDREWS ON HONOR ROLL

Bid Opening May 4 On Test Pit of Hill Creek Dam Site SE of Eugene

Bids for the excavation and timbering of a test pit for subsurface investigation of the proposed Hill Creek dam site, 45 miles southeast of Eugene, was invited by the Portland District, Corps of Engineers, April 20.

Hill Creek Dam, an authorized flood control project for which construction funds have not been appropriated, will be located on the Middle Fork Willamette River 26.5 miles upstream from Lookout Point Dam. Some planning funds were available last year and again this year, according to Colonel Thomas H. Lipscomb, Portland District Engineer.

Bids for the test pit will be opened at 2 p.m., May 4 and all work must be completed by June 15. Estimated quantities include mobilization and demobilization, 65 vertical feet of test pit excavation and 20 hours of standby time for taking samples. Bids will be invited under serial NO. CIVENG-35-026-54-133.

The Hill Creek project will consist of an earth and gravel fill dam, chute-type spillway, power and outlet tunnels and a powerhouse with an installed generating capacity of 30,000 kilowatts. Hill Creek and Lookout Point reservoirs will be operated as an integrated unit.

Estimated cost of the Hill Creek dam is \$32,261,000. Total average annual benefits will be \$3,021,600 and the project will prevent annual flood damage totaling \$1,881,700.

Camp Easter Seal To Open July 1

REEDSPORT, OREG., (Special) —Camp Easter Seal, Oregon's only summer camp for crippled children, tentatively plans to receive its first group of young campers July 1st, Howard Feast, executive director of the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults, the Easter Seal Society, has announced.

"A lot of our planning is based on the success of the current Easter Seal sale," Feast stated, "and so far it looks like we're going to be in a position to get things under way."

tract on North lake of Ten-Mile lake, near Reedsport. It is accessible only by water and the society has been given a 28-foot cruiser with which to transport the youngsters to the camp.

Labor unions, service organizations, industries, business houses and women's organizations from Coos and Douglas counties have contributed materials, labor and money to the camp and work has been under way for several months looking towards its opening.

Feast said the present plan is to accommodate from 15 to 20 children every 10 days, from July 1 to September 1. A permanent-type dormitory facility, adequate for the housing of physically handicapped children, is being readied and an administration building for the staff is complete.

The camp's staff will include a physical therapist and experienced camp leaders. The children, Feast said, will be given outdoor camp opportunities to the limits of their physical ability. There will be boating, fishing and crafts.

Camp Easter Seal will be open to the physically handicapped children from all parts of the state.

Six Safety Tips

UO to Offer Course In Family Financing

Scholarships for the session will be made available to more than 330 high school teachers and other educators by the university and seven other leading universities throughout the country. 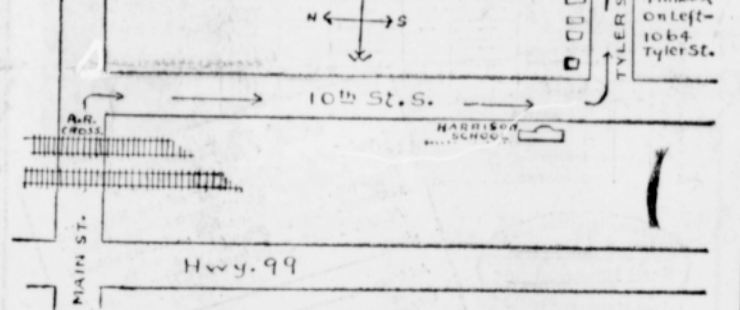
