School District 40 Meets, Calls Election May 7

CRESWELL.—At the last regular meeting of the directors of School District 40, Creswell, it was decided to submit to the voters of the district, two propositions having to do with school finances, on Friday, May 7, at the Creswell grade school between the hours of 2 and 8 p.m.

The first proposition seeks authorization by the voters to use a balance remaining in the building fund for the purpose of repaying outstanding bonds. On July 1, this year, the bonds formerly sold for building purposes are callable on any interest-bearing date and the balance in the building fund would retire four such bonds, effecting an approximate saving of \$1,440.00 in interest.

A small remaining balance in this fund would then be invested in government bonds until such time as it may be needed.

The second proposition is one which board members feel would be a definite step toward sound financial procedures and concerns the establishing of a small yearly levy for the purpose of starting a sinking fund for future building or equipment needs. The proposition asks approval of a serial levy in the amount of \$4,775.70 (two mills on 1952 evaluation) per year for two years.

At the end of each fiscal year, as soon as such money became available to the district, it would be invested in government bonds and draw interest until such time as it might be needed. If the plan is deemed successful it is expected the question would again be submitted to the voters at the end of two years asking that it be continued.

A special election would always have to be held seeking authorization before the directors could use the sinking fund for any purpose, including construction or equipment purchases.

CRESWELL.—Charles N. Butler of 127 E. 10th Ave., Eugene, was a victim of a car-train accident at the Southern Pacific crossing at Creswell Saturday evening. He was alone in his car and apparently did not see the warning signal and drove in front of a freight train going north. The Creswell Ambulance was called, but Butler died before reaching a hospital in Eugene. Head injuries were reported to have caused his death.

Mr. Butler was 56 years of age and was a glazier at the Associated Plywood Co. mill at Springfield. He is survived by three daughters, Alice Dailey and Dorothy Butler of Eugene and Mary Lou Higgins of Springfield. Two brothers and a sister live in western Oregon. Funeral services were held in Eugene Tuesday with interment at Myrtle Point.
