

Bride Carries Black Lace Fan Family Heirloom at Church Wedding 17th

A tall copper urn of forsythia and three candelabra with tall yellow tapers formed the background for the double ring wedding ceremony of Miss Carolyn Moore and Kenneth A. Ostby at the First Presbyterian Church Saturday night, April 17. The Rev. D. Hugh Peniston performed the ceremony before a large group of relatives and friends. The bride carried out the old adage of "something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue," and a penny in her shoe.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Moore, Cottage Grove, and mother of the bridegroom is Mrs. Maud E. Ostby, Eugene. The bride was escorted to the altar by her father. Her gown was of white slipper satin and lace. Her full skirt ended in a court train, while her bodice, long pointed sleeves and pointed overskirt were of lace.

The bodice was fashioned with a V-neckline and Queen Ann collar. A white Juliet lace cap trimmed with seed pearls, held her full Cathedral veil in place.

She carried a black lace fan covered with yellow daffodils. The fan had belonged to her great-grandmother, and sent to her by her great-grandmother in Virginia. Her wedding dress was "something new," a lace hanky was "something borrowed" from an aunt, Mrs. Ross Beeson, and a blue satin garter, was "something blue," made by Mrs. George Witters. The penny in her shoe was given her by Mrs. John Harrison. Her French crystal necklace and earrings were gifts from the bridegroom.

Each wore matching mitts and green headdresses and carried arm bouquets of yellow daffodils. Little flower girl, Susan Lea Morelock, niece of the bride wore a gown identical to the other attendants. Nephew of the bride, Phillip Stroup, was ringbearer. He wore a white shirt and black pants, and carried the rings on a white satin pillow made in heart shape.

The bride's mother wore a dress of blue lace, while the bridegroom's mother wore blue gabardine and each wore a corsage of Talisman roses.
