CG Hi Musicians Prepare for Contest

The Choir, Band, and Girls' Chorus will participate in the annual Western Oregon District Music Competition Festival at Eugene High School Saturday, May 1. As in past years, each group will play or sing three selections and be judged on such items as tone quality, pitch, enunciation, appearance, and expression.

Besides the required number "Transcendence" by Frankiger, the Band will play "Knightsbridge March" by Coates, and "Pax et Labor."

The Choir will sing "When Allen-A-Dale Went A-Hunting" by Robert De Pearsall, "Hail Glendening Light," and a Latin chant, "Kyrie Eleison" composed by Professor Milton Dieterich of the University of Oregon.

"May Day Carol," "May Now Thy Spirit," and "Breakers of Barranquilla," a South American nocturne, have been chosen for the Girls' Chorus to perform.

Selected as valedictorian and salutatorian of the senior class at Cottage Grove Union high school last week were Myrtle Johnson and Carole McCracken.

As salutatorian Miss Johnson has a grade point of 1.18. Miss McCracken won salutatorian honors with a grade average of 1.25.

Both Myrtle and Carole plan to attend the U of O for two years to get their pre-nursing education. From here they plan to go to the School of Nursing in Portland to get their regular nurses training. Myrtle wants to specialize in surgery. Carole plans to become a doctor if she likes nursing well enough.

Myrtle has attended Cottage Grove High all four years and has been in about every activity there is. Her freshman and sophomore year she received recognition for highest scholastic average. Her junior year she was secretary-treasurer of Lionettes and was in the class play. She was assistant general chairman of the Prom her junior year and participated in FHA for four years.

As a senior she was active in Honor Society, Quill and Scroll, was vice president of Thespians and assistant editor to Lions' Roar. She also helped direct the Senior Play and was elected treasurer of her class.

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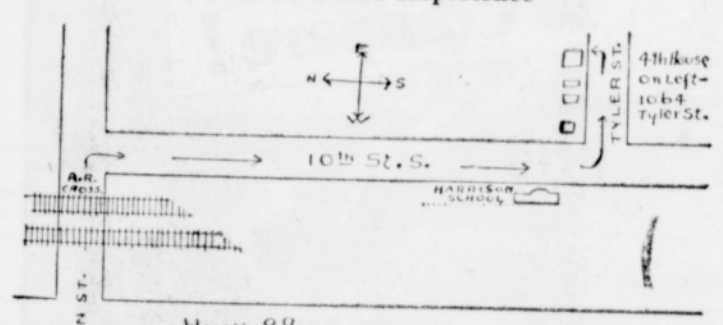
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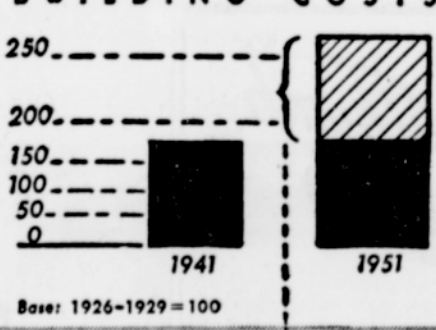
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
