### Tony Maucione Tells BPW Members Growth of KSGA

Tony Maucione, manager of Cottage Grove's radio station KSGA, in an informal talk to Business and Professional Women's club Monday night, May 3, told of the growth of the station during the past year and received plaudits from club members for its local programs.

Maucione told the club he liked the station as a local station rather than a network one and praised the local businessmen for their support of the station through advertising.

He went on to say that a lot of time was also given to public service programs, such as school programs, the Chamber of Commerce hour and programs for service organizations.

In answer to why the station was not a network, Tony explained that for instance the station could not broadcast live sports events, since they would interfere with network programs. He also said that he personally believed that the local type station was best.

One club member commented that she enjoyed the "fine record programs."

In answer to a request for publishing of programs in the local newspaper, Tony said that perhaps this could be worked out in the future. He also told of plans for development of more local programs. He urged clubs like BPW to send news in to the station and that it would be used as a public service.
