Governor Calls Ed TV Conference

SALEM, May 1.—A citizens' conference on educational television has been called for May 10 at the state capitol building by Governor Paul Patterson under the auspices of the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education.

Purpose of the conference is to determine citizen interest in the new instrument of mass communication and education. The public is invited to view kinescope recordings of educational television programs produced in other parts of the country, and to hear Paul A. Walker, former chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, plus national representatives of the Joint Committee on Educational Television and the National Citizens' Committee for Educational Television.

Governor Patterson and State Superintendent of Public Instruction Rex Putnam will also participate in the meeting.

In the eleven western states, Alaska and Hawaii, 57 channels have been reserved for non-commercial educational use. Four of these channels are marked for Oregon utilization. In the 1953 Legislature, a bill was introduced for a state transmitter on Mary's Peak near Corvallis with a relay transmitter on Council Crest in Portland, but it lacked sufficient support for passage.

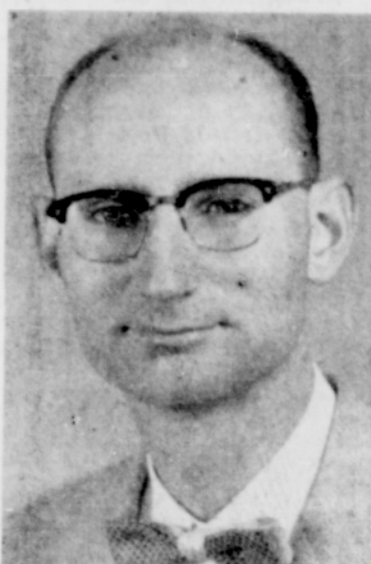

Darkroom "Prospecting" Wins Award

A technical paper, entitled "Darkroom 'Prospecting'" and written by Wally Barrong of Cottage Grove and Alden Burdick of Eugene, received high honors at the 4th annual convention of the Oregon Society of X-ray Technicians held in Salem last month. Barrong is the x-ray technician at Cottage Grove hospital, and Burdick is x-ray technician at the Orthopedic and Fracture Clinic in Eugene.

The paper aptly pointed out that by the use of a Tamco Silver collector to recover the silver in film developing solution, a high percentage of the 15 tons of silver sent down drains throughout the USA each week could be reused.

Barrong and Burdick received a certificate for "contributing to the advancement of the science and art of clinical radiography in the State of Oregon." They also were given a \$25 cash award.

Cut Solution Cost
The paper contained a brief history of early silver collecting by various methods. The authors then presented a compilation of written data showing that the use of Tamco Silver Collectors can cut the cost of solution by one-third, and that a profit of 50 per cent of all silver collected can be realized in any x-ray department, regardless of size.

This method was first discovered

in 1918 by N. B. Aukerman. At the present time Tamco furnished the saving units and, in turn, is given one half of the silver reclaimed. Barrong said he and Burdick wrote and presented the paper to speed the use of the Tamco Silver Collector in x-ray departments in Oregon so as to save money, solutions and silver.

Print, Film Developing
The method devised has been used in x-ray film developing and it can be used in print developing. The silver is recovered from the solution in the fixing baths. Use of the collector means a saving of fixings purchased annually by a hospital, because the solutions will last longer when the silver is removed, Barrong said.

Dr. James B. Haworth of Salem presented the paper awards to the two men. The convention was held in the Senator Hotel and more than 125 were present during the three-day session, April 1-3.

Barrong is president of District 3 (Eugene) of the X-ray Society.

Bob Bauder Wins Convention Trip To St. Petersburg

For the third consecutive year Bob Bauder, agent for the State Farm Insurance Companies, won a trip to the annual State Farm Insurance Companies Leaders' club convention, this year held at St. Petersburg, Fla., April 5, 6 and 7. Qualification to receive this trip to the convention is high sales production in all three companies, State Farm Auto, State Farm Life and State Farm Fire.

The past three years Bauder has won Leaders' club designation and has attended their conventions. In 1952 he went to Chicago and in 1953 attended the convention at San Diego.

These conventions are sponsored by State Farm Insurance Companies. The trip home was made thru the middle states visiting points of interest, including Civil War spots, and at Denver, they visited relatives, and returned home thru Salt Lake City.

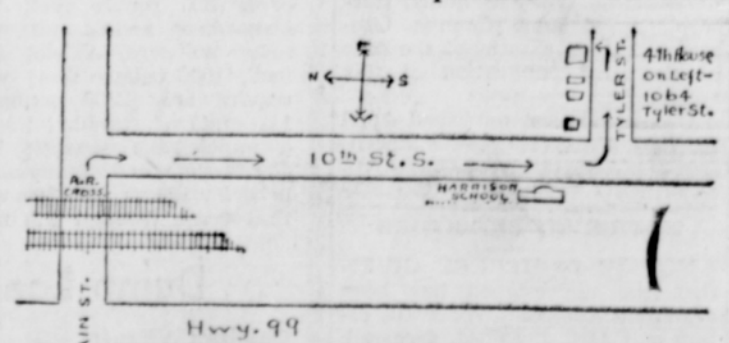
