## Traffic Violators Escape Punishment

Oregon traffic law violators often escape punishment commensurate with violations they have committed, Captain Walter Lansing, coordinator of the state traffic safety division, said recently. "The fault does not rest entirely with the courts," Lansing said, "but with the average citizen who does not realize that traffic violators are potential killers and, therefore, goes easy on violators when serving on a jury or in giving testimony against drivers they have seen operating unsafely or who were involved in accidents."

Last year, Lansing said, the average person arrested by State Police and convicted of reckless driving—the only violation which assumes the driver has "willfully and wantonly" disregarded rights and safety of others—was fined \$45.75 and given a 5.2 day jail sentence. Frequently, fines and jail sentences are suspended.

Drunk drivers fared somewhat worse: the average fine was \$180.37 and the average jail sentence was 16.8 days. Here again, Lansing said suspension of all or part of the sentence often occurs.

"Until drivers are made to realize that violation of traffic laws is a serious offense against fellow-citizens, and until drivers know that violation will result in certain and stiff punishment, traffic accidents and deaths will continue to be a major problem," Lansing declared.

## U. S. Army Cutting Big Grocery Bill

WASHINGTON—The Army is cutting its grocery bill.

By setting up additional meat cutting plants at military installations throughout the country, the cost of three square meals a day is being reduced.

The plants are being set up in the interest of economy and efficiency. Operation of these plants permits the Army Quartermaster to buy whole carcasses of beef rather than the more expensive boneless beef.

The boneless beef—served extensively overseas and in the continental United States—where central meat cutting facilities are not available—costs on the average of two cent a pound more than whole carcass beef.

At the meat cutting plants, approximately 30 per cent of the carcass goes into steaks or dry roasts, 20 per cent into pot roasts or Swiss steaks, 12 per cent into stew meat, and 38 per cent into ground beef for hamburgers or meat loaves.

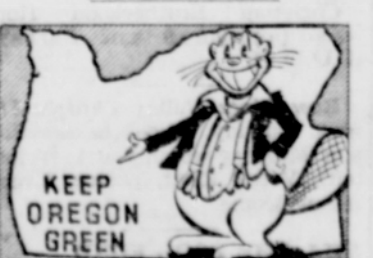
Lard is Obtained

The meat cutting plants also are equipped with fat rendering equipment to process fat trimmings. Lard obtained from these trimmings will decrease purchase of commercial lard.

Army cooking experience has taught that not more than half an inch of fat should be left on stew meat, and that roasts, chops and steaks should have not more than one-half to three-quarters of an inch of fat. Larger portions of fat on the meats result in plate waste.
