LONDON—The May 5 meeting of the London WCTU was held at the home of Mrs. Arden Powell with 13 attending. Mr. and Mrs. John Meyers of Eugene were special guests. Meyers, who has been a counselor and worker for 25 years with the boys at the training school at Woodburn, talked on "What the State of Oregon is Doing for Delinquent Boys." He also talked on the psychology of the delinquent and named four things necessary that they learn and observe, namely: obedience to law; respect to other people; work; and reverence to God. Meyers is now doing replacement work and he explained that there are available funds for about 40 placements a year. Homes with older people is best. There are 230 boys currently at Woodburn.

In observance of Mother's Day, following the devotionals, Clara Foster read a "Creed to Mother" and Mrs. Meyers played and sang, "When Mother Prays." Mrs. Ollie Powell gave a talk in explanation of the work and projects of the WCTU and that the local organization is doing in the community. **Distinguished Folk Visit at DV Home**

Sir William Wood K.B.E. and Lady Wood of Walford, England, have arrived for a visit of several months at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Forrest Woods. They came to Montreal on the "Empress of Scotland" and then across Canada via Vancouver and to Eugene where they were met by the Forrest Woods family. They have made several visits to the United States and were in Cottage Grove three years ago.

Sir William Valentine Wood retired from membership of the British Transport Commission in August, 1953. His distinguished career in the railway service began at the age of 15 in the accountant's office of the Belfast and Northern Counties Railway. He held a number of positions in railway service and in 1921 was appointed accountant to the Ministry but resumed railway service in 1924 as assistant accountant-general of the London Midland and Scottish Railway. Three years later he became controller of costs and statistics which position he vacated on January 1, 1930, when he was appointed vice-president of the finance departments.

**Succeeds Lord Stamp**  
In June, 1941, he succeeded the late Lord Stamp as president of the L.M.S. executive, a position he occupied until his acceptance of membership of the newly formed British Transport Commission in 1947. During his long career, Sir William has rendered invaluable service to the British railways by appearing on numerous occasions on their behalf before parliamentary committees and other important bodies. He has made many worthwhile contributions to the proceedings of the Institute of Transport of which he has been an energetic member and was elected president in 1943. He was chairman of the General Managers Conference at the Railway Clearing House in 1933, 1937 and 1945, was awarded a knighthood in the Coronation Honours List of 1937 and received a K.B.E. (Knight of the British Empire) in the New Year Honours of 1947. He worked in close contact with the American forces in England during World War II and was awarded the Legion of Merit with Gold Palm.
