Cpl. Robert Summers Builds Good Will By Work in Germany

Cpl. Robert Summers with Co. B, 35th Engineer Battalion in Germany is building German-American good will in Germany the past few months by using the Company's bulldozer to level the ground in some places and excavating in others. Some interesting clippings from German papers have been sent to his wife, Barbara, telling of the work being done. They read in part:

Cpl. Robert Summers, the B Co. bulldozer operator, added another star to his German-American relations crown when he completed the earthwork for a sports platz for one of Bamberg's Catholic churches. The job consisted of stripping and leveling an area about 75 yards by 150 yards and involved the moving of approximately 1,000 cubic yards of earth.

Cpl. Summers also recently completed a 300-yard-long glider field for the church's Youth Center, and excavated the foundation for the proposed Catholic church. He leveled the airstrip at Burg Feuerstein in front of the chapel, also the big square in front of St. Kunigund and athletic field at Hallstadt, as well as several other places.

Another job credited to B Co., with Cpl. Summers operating the bulldozer was the retrieving of an M-47 tank after it had been stuck for a week in a frozen stream during a field exercise.

It was reported a dangerous job, because the tank carried a combat load of 99mm ammunition. Summers has been dubbed "The Acrobat" for his skill in handling the bulldozer.

MARTIN PARTICIPATES IN AIR DROP

BEPPU, JAPAN—Pvt. Luther D. Martin, whose father, Luther W. Martin, lives in Yoncalla, Ore., recently participated in the first mass air drop in the Far East using the Army's new T-10 parachute.

Martin was one of 1,000 "Rakkasans" in the 187th Airborne Regimental Combat Team's 2d Battalion who bailed out near Oita, Japan, during the mass training exercise.

The Yoncalla soldier, who joined the team last December, is a wireman in the battalion's Headquarters Company. A veteran of Korean duty, he wears the UN and Korean Service Ribbons.

PVT. SIMONSEN TAKING PART IN MANEUVERS
