Local CC Growth Praised by Guests

At a general meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce Tuesday noon at Moose Hall, members heard brief talks by Guy Leonard, assistant manager of the Portland Chamber where he is director of public relations, and Chester Starrett, director of industries for the Portland CC. The visitors were introduced by Bob Bauder.

Leonard complimented the Chamber on its "tremendous growth in the past year since my friend Chick (Manager Chick Hiltbrand) came down." Leonard had just returned from a Chamber meeting in Fort Worth, Texas. He told those present that he expected a 30 to 40 percent increase in population on the Pacific Coast every 10 years.

Outgrowing Clothes
"The cities and towns are outgrowing their clothes," he added, "and must be prepared for the increase by having job opportunities, schools' housing and good roads for the newcomers."

Starrett, who has just been in the East touring industries where he represented Oregon industry, said he found that many companies were interested in the potentialities of the area. He said the eastern concerns were particularly interested in the soft water and low cost power, "chemical companies, in particular."

Starrett stressed that Oregon communities need to develop diversity of industry. He cited the increasing diversity of Portland industry—metal working, lumber, food processing—as a good example.

Following the general meeting, the two men met with special Chamber committees and interested folk. Leonard talked to the membership, public relations and education committees and the Board of Directors. Starrett met with the industry, mining, lumber and housing committee members and interested Grovians.

Two new Chamber members, Ray Nelson of Nelson Electric and E. A. Everett, Valley Variety, were introduced at the noon meeting.
