Wrinkle Resistant Cottons Rate High For Vacation Wear

Wrinkle-resistant and spot-resistant finishes have earned cottons a new place in vacation wardrobes. Murle Scales, Oregon State college extension clothing specialist, said these new finishes will save concern about laundering.

Wrinkle-resistant cottons may be slightly heavier than the same fabric untreated, she said, but they will not hold creases from wear or folds from packing in a suitcase. Miss Scales suggested that when they are packed, however, they should have tissue paper between the folds to avoid sharp creases.

Some blends of cotton and synthetics help with crease-resistance, too, she said. They also dry quickly after washing. Spot-resistant finishes keep soil and dust from clinging or penetrating very easily, she explained.

The clothing specialist noted that new damask-like cottons are a good travelers' cotton because they do not show dust readily.

With some of the newer type cottons, the iron can be left at home. Among those that take little or no ironing are crinkled cottons, plisse's and seersuckers or the French-knot cottons.

If these crinkled fabrics are put on hangers to dry after laundering, they may need only a little finger-pressing on seams, collars and around armholes, Miss Scales said. Others will take a light pressing with a warm iron.

When choosing cottons for travel, think about dark colors, prints, plaids and checks, she suggested. They usually show soil and wrinkles less than light plain colors. White collars or cuffs on women's clothes should be removable for washing.

Moderately full skirts usually are more comfortable and keep their looks better than tight or very full skirts, Miss Scales noted.



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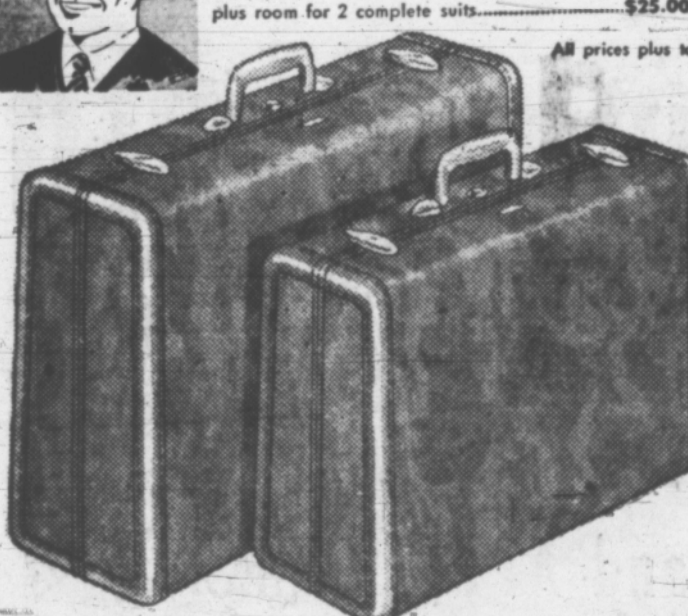


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
