Applesauce Cake For the Connoisseur

"Our taste buds 'reved' into full gear when we read the favorite recipe of Wayne Robinson, Weyerhaeuser head cook at White River. Robinson's favorite recipe concerns the making of applesauce cake. We don't think he'll mind our passing it on to Sentinel readers."

The ingredients below go into a camp-size recipe. Chef Robinson says it's designed to serve 30 or more people. He advises cutting the amounts in half for ordinary family-size quantity.

Applesauce Cake
1 cup shortening
4 cups sugar
2 eggs (beaten)
3 cups unsweetened applesauce
1 cup boiling water
4 teaspoons baking soda
5 cups cake flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon cloves
1 teaspoon allspice
2 cups chopped raisins
1 cup chopped walnuts

Cream shortening and sugar; blend in eggs and applesauce. Sift flour, salt and spices and add to first mixture alternately with boiling water in which baking soda has been dissolved. Blend in raisins and walnuts. Bake at 350 degrees F. about 45 minutes. Use loaf pan, layer pans or cup cake tins.
