

Swim Pool Fund Climbs Near \$20,000 Honor Roll Planned

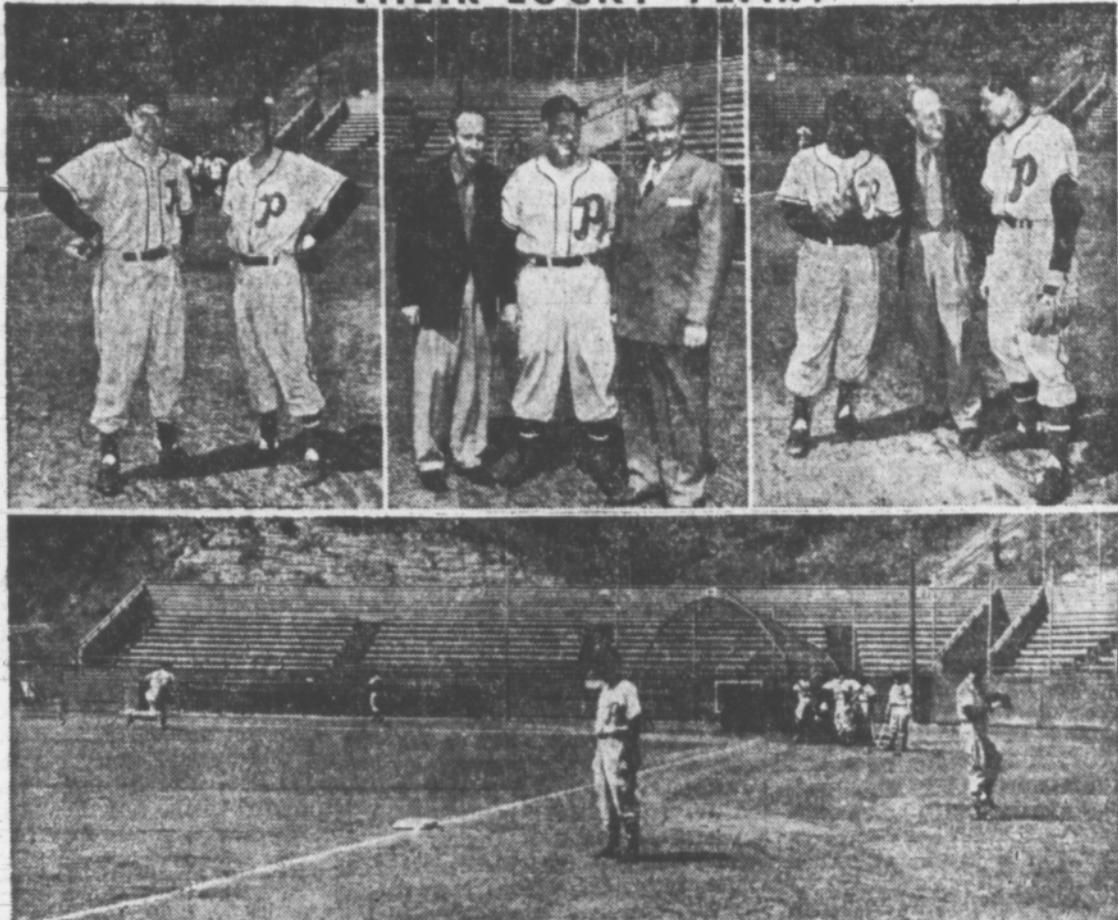
As the "spring offensive" to raise money for the south Lane county swim pool rolled into its third week, official figures showed that nearly \$20,000 has been pledged or donated, South Lane Recreation, Inc. chairman Mrs. Norman Richards said Wednesday that quite a bit of money is being mailed in or brought in by the individual contributors.

She said that as a result of the site information appearing in last week's Sentinel, the offer of another pool site off S. Tenth Street had come to the Board of Directors, if they cared to purchase the site. Mrs. Richards urged any persons knowing of possible locations to contact one of the directors immediately. She added that because more questions have arisen concerning pool cost a complete listing of needed pool expenditures will appear in next week's paper. In the same issue or the following one, questions and answers concerning the pool will be printed.

Individuals having questions should contact SLRI or call the questions in to this newspaper. According to SLRI secretary Mrs. Jean Griggs, shareholder certificates will be mailed out after July 4.

Mrs. Richards said that an honor roll of pledgers and donors to the swim pool will be printed in the Sentinel later this month. As more contributions are sent in, more names will be added.

DRAIN MAN INJURED IN CYCLE OVERTURN

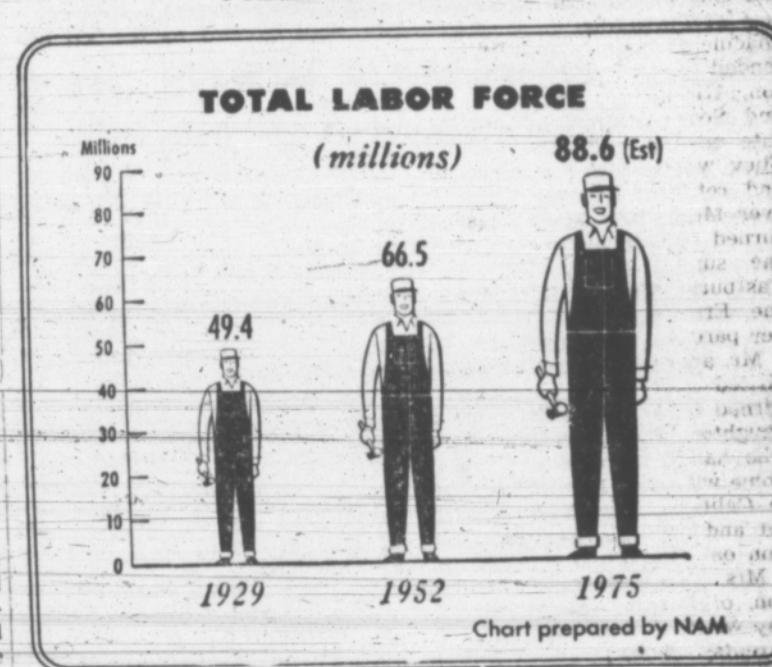

The Lewis and Clark Expedition Commemorated in Original Painting



The spirit of one of the most important events in this country's history, The Lewis and Clark expedition, has been captured by Dean Cornwell, N.A., in an original painting commemorating the 150th anniversary of the start of the expedition on May 14th, 1804. Cornwell's painting was commissioned by the New York Life Insurance Company and this photo of it shows Meriwether Lewis holding the oar and William Clark seated on the ground with a map in a scene on the Upper Missouri River. The expedition, which opened up the vast Northwest to the mouth of the Columbia River, began at 4:00 P.M., May 14th, 1804. The men did not return until September, 1806.

Piano Workshops For Teachers Scheduled For 3 Schools June 7-12

A series of piano workshops, designed to help piano teachers improve their keyboard instruction has been scheduled at Oregon State college, Linfield college and Willamette university, June 7 to 12.

The workshops are open to private teachers and teachers of class piano. George Hummel of Montana State university school of music, one of the nation's lead-

ing piano teachers, will be workshop director. Identical two-day workshops will be held on each campus during the week. OSC's meeting is June 11 and 12. The Willamette workshop is scheduled June 7 and 8 and Linfield college, 9 and 10. The \$10 registration fee entitles teachers to attend any one of all of the workshops.

The two-day program includes discussions and demonstrations in beginner lessons. Teachers attending will have opportunity for individual conferences with Hummel. Displays of new teaching materials are also planned.

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
