Grove Man Wins In Coquille Rodeo

J. B. Leonard of Cottage Grove and Steve Hill of Eugene won second place in the team roping event at the annual Jackpot Rodeo in Coquille June 6. Their team time was 52 seconds which included a 10-second penalty for Hill's horse breaking the barrier.

Approximately 50 persons participated in the rodeo which consists of five events: saddle bronc riding, steer stopping, wild cow milking, calf roping and team roping. The rodeo is open to amateur or professional entrants and is held at the Claver ranch, some two miles out of Coquille. It is conducted under the Rodeo-Cowboy Association rules.

The Wildcow milking event was won by Louis Torricellas of Lodi and Ernest Mann of Springfield.

Among the participants were entries from California, Washington and New Mexico, as well as Oregon.

Oregon U. Places Three Men on ND All Star Team

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State took over the 1954 All-Northern Division baseball team announced here Saturday by the league coaches and publicity directors.

The Webfoots landed five players, the Beavers three and the Cougars two as five of the 10-man squad won their positions without much trouble and the other five edged out competitors in very tight balloting.

Jay Dean of Oregon State at first base, Terry Sparks of Washington State in the outfield and Norm Forbes of Oregon as a pitcher all were unanimous choices. George Shaw of Oregon in the outfield and Chuck Fisk of the Beavers at second base received all but one vote. Shaw, Forbes and Dean are repeaters from last season and this is the third straight year on the All-Star squad for Shaw.

The closest races were between Oregon's Neal Marlett and Washington's Jack Ballard for catcher, Pete Williams of Oregon and Flip Kleffner of Idaho at third base, Jack Keller of Oregon, Ron Foisy of Washington State and Bob Buob of Oregon State at shortstop and the scramble for the third outfield spot between Jack Pinion of OSC and Washington's Roland Hallé and Idaho's Bob Falash.

Marlett edged Ballard by a pair of votes, Williams nipped Kleffner by the same margin. Keller won over Buob by one tally, and Pinion nipped Hallé by the same margin. The second pitching post went to Lee Dolquist of WSC over Trenton Huls of Oregon.

Youth dominated the team this spring with Pinion the lone senior named to the squad. Keller is a sophomore and the other eight players are all juniors.

The "dream" team has plenty of power with Forbes leading the league at .476, Dean hitting .439, Fisk finished at .400, Sparks had a .399, Shaw a .328, Pinion batted a .395, Marlett a .321, and the lineup was rounded out by William's .254 and Keller's .246. In the pitching department Forbes won six and lost one while Dolquist was undefeated in three starts.

Midwestern Quail Coming to Oregon

Through the courtesy and cooperation of the Kansas Forestry, Fish, and Game Commission, Oregon's bobwhite quail will have a chance to mingle with some of their mid-western relatives if activities now in progress are successful according to a statement released today by P. W. Schneider, state game director.

Seven hundred bobwhite eggs were shipped from one of their hatcheries via air freight to Portland this week. At Portland, they were picked up by Cliff West, gamekeeper at the Hermiston game farm, and transferred to that station.

The eggs will be incubated at the Hermiston farm and then released at several points in the state in the hope that they will not only increase the present stock but also serve to introduce hybrid vigor into the future broods.

Safety Techniques In Boating Urged

"Know your boat when you row your boat." This phrase could well be adopted by everyone to cut down on the number of tragic boat accidents that occur each year.

Already in 1954 several persons have lost their lives because of poor boat handling techniques.

The Oregon State Game Commission has printed in the 1954 angling regulations synopsis the Oregon law on operation of motor boats which reads, "It is always unlawful not to navigate at all times a motor boat in a careful and prudent manner and at such rate of speed as not to endanger the property of another or the life or limb of any person."

In addition to the Oregon law which makes careless boat operation illegal, the Outboard Boating club of America has some tips to offer regarding ways to save a life, perhaps your own.

Common sense pointers suggested by the Outboard Boating club are:

1. Don't overload your boat's weight capacity.
2. Don't overpower your boat.
3. Don't show off.
4. Don't go out in bad weather.
5. Always carry a buoyant preserver or cushion for each passenger.

And as a final bit of advice, the boating club states, "Common sense should prevent an upset, but if one does occur STAY WITH THE BOAT."

Consideration of these factors can well make a boating excursion restful instead of fateful.

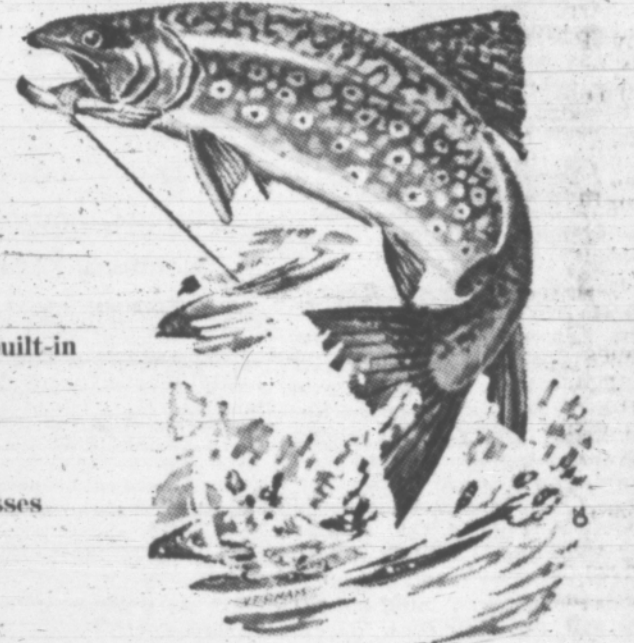

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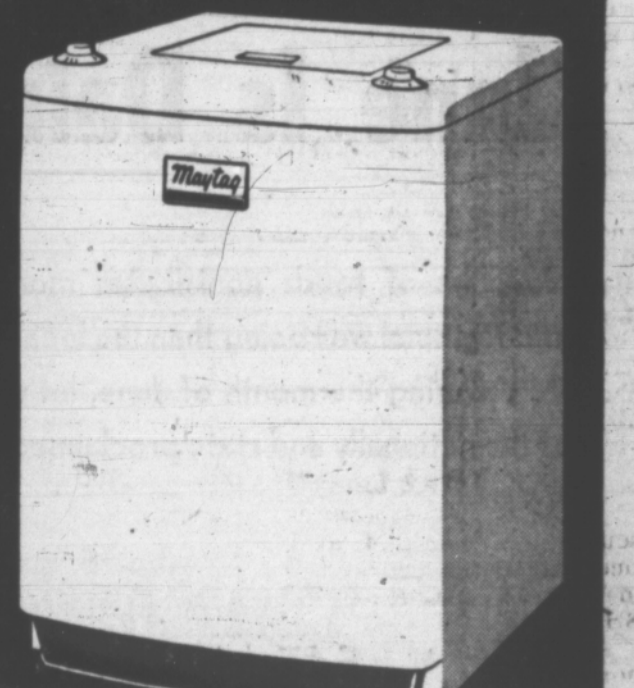
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
