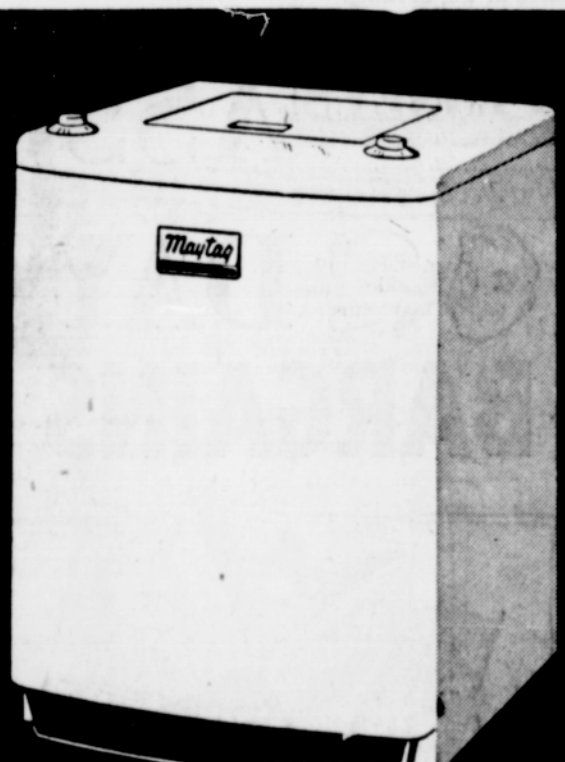

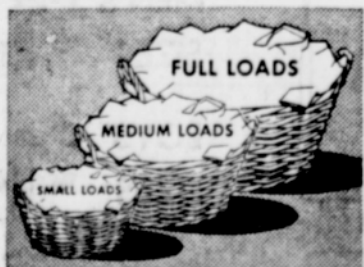

Industrial research and development have broadened the base of our entire economy and, even more important, have laid the groundwork for a steadily increasing expansion in the years to come.
