South Lane Recreation, Inc., Summer Program Activities to Begin June 28

The summer recreation program, under the sponsorship of the South Lane Recreation, will start its main program of activities June 28.

Park Activities Scheduled
A supervisor at the City Park will be on duty daily from 1-5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Equipment and facilities for badminton, volleyball, horseshoes, ping pong, tether ball, croquet, and barnyard golf will be available. The park play area is regularly equipped with swings, rings, slides, bars and a sand box. The city is also planning on installing a black-topped outdoor basketball court and backboard. A story hour for the smaller visitors will be scheduled. Other activities planned at the park are baton twirling classes and evening skating on the old tennis court.

Swimming at CG Dam Halted
The swimming program at the Cottage Grove Lake has been discontinued due to the hazardous conditions that prevail. The usual Red Cross swimming classes will be conducted starting August 2 at the Willamalane pool in Springfield. To fill the need for supervised swimming during the summer, one bus will transport swimmers to the Drain pool daily Monday through Friday. There will be no charge for transportation but a 20 cent pool charge will be made.

The first swimming bus will start operating on Wednesday, June 20, and will take boys. A girls bus will run the following day. The bus will leave the park daily at 1:15 and return at 4:30 p.m. Next year's third grade students will be the minimum age group transported.

Touch football and track ac-

tivities are scheduled for the high school field Monday evenings at 7 p.m. The high school gym will be open for basketball on Wednesday evenings.

The Teen-Age dance scheduled for Friday, July 2, will be postponed due to interference with the Fourth of July week end.

The band program and other activities will not start until after the Fourth of July vacation period. Weekly announcements will be made regarding other scheduled summer activities. A bulletin board will also be maintained at the park.

Baseball Turnouts Good
The baseball programs are off to a good start even though poor weather has been hampering the practice sessions.

The Pee-wee baseball program under Frank Divers and sponsored by District 45, has a turnout of approximately 60. The large group of younger boys turning out necessitated a special practice session for the nine and under age group. Regular intercity play started last week with two games at Sutherlin. The local six team league has not been formed as yet.

Mel Fox's Midget group sponsored by District 14 has been holding afternoon practice sessions due to Fox's attendance at the University of Oregon coaching school and to eliminate interference with the Daily Bible school. They will switch to morning sessions later.
