Al Martin Named New Sentinel N. E.

Appointment of Al Martin as news editor of the Sentinel, effective July 1, was announced Wednesday by editor and publisher, C. Martin. Al, a 34 graduate of the University of Oregon School of Journalism, replaces Miss Laura Olson, who joins the editorial staff of the Roseburg News-Review July 12.

The new news editor is well qualified for his position. In addition to his collegiate work in journalism, he has worked on the Sentinel during vacations and in the summer.

At the University, where he was a member of the social fraternity Beta Theta Pi, Martin was also a member of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity, and Druids, junior men's service honorary.

A three-year letterman in track at the UO, Martin was an outstanding northern division runner. He took second in the mile run in the Northern Division Meet in his sophomore and junior years, won third place in the Pacific Coast Conference mile in his sophomore year; was fifth in the PCC mile his junior year; and was a member of the Oregon relay team that placed third in the PCC in '53. Martin did not compete his senior year because of a pulled ligament in his right knee.

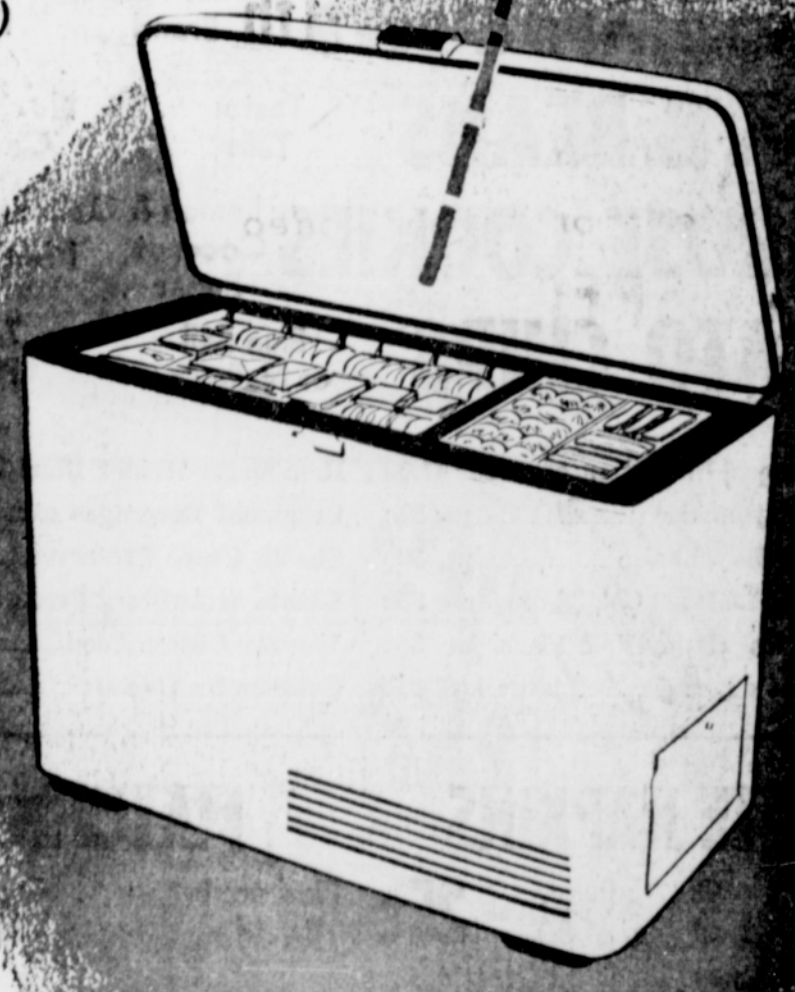

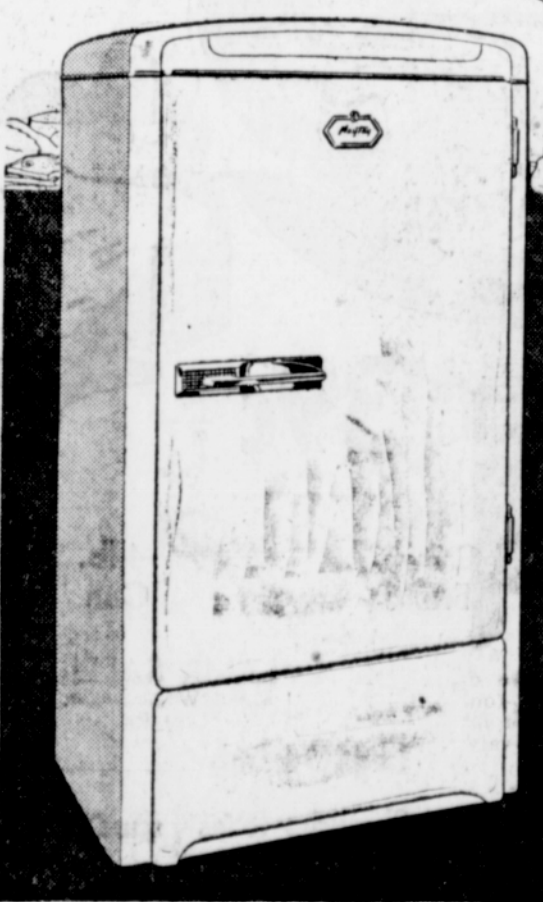
