First Half of 1954 Postal Receipts Show 3.6% Gain 1953 Shows Drop

If postal receipts can be counted as the business barometer of the community it serves, then business during the first six months of 1953 was not as good as it was cracked up to be. In most instances, the 1953 business in general is running ahead of the same period of 1954, but not so here.

Quarterly report of Sam Veatch, postmaster, shows that total receipts of the Cottage Grove office to be \$31,958.10 for the first six months of 1953 as compared with \$33,168.79 for the first six months of 1954. This was a gain of roughly 3.6 per cent. In 1952 the receipts amounted to \$32,668.92.

Receipts of the Cottage Grove office have shown a consistent gain for the past 20 years and 1953 was the first time a drop was noted and this was just after the post office was moved to new quarters.
