Church of Christ Camp at Dorena Now in Session

The Church of Christ (Sixth and Gibbs) is now in its second week of camp at its campsite on Row River, 12 miles east of town. The first week of camp was for adults and the second week for high school age children.

Speakers here for the adult camp included Leo Yoder from Portland; A. L. Payne, Winston Salem Bible college, North Carolina; Don DeWalt, San Jose Bible college, San Jose, Calif.; Yoshemitsu Higa, Okinawa and Floyd Hughes, Nassau, Bahamas. Higa was formerly from Formosa, where he worked with a sugar factory and Hughes is now a missionary in the Bahamas Islands.

C. H. Phillips from the Puget Sound Bible College at Seattle, who was to teach a daily class, had a heart attack early in the week of adult camp and was taken to the Cottage Grove hospital.

Registration for the adult camp showed 50 residents and 367 registered throughout the week (mostly visitors).

The senior camp which started Sunday, shows a registration of 84 high school age young people including faculty. They represent 13 different churches in the locality.

Speakers for this week include Floyd Hughes from Nassau, Don DeWalt from San Jose Bible College, Hubert Prather, Gary Wells, Erwin Marshall, Mel Coffman and Roy Aubrey.

There are two weeks of camp left with registration for the intermediates to begin Sunday afternoon at 3 p.m. The week after will be the junior camp.

After service of more than 40 years, the phone which first served Claude Kem at The Modern Pharmacy, later at Kems and most recently at Kems for Drugs, was retired. And, its tone and reliability were ever bit as good as when first installed. It was a wall phone, with a long neck and mahogany back. Twin bells made the sound.

According to Kem, who watched as telephone repairman Ed Maloney replaced the vet with one of those spanking new types, he'd never had any trouble with it. "The phone never got out of whack," Kem opined, "matter of fact it was sometimes a darn cite better than the girls on the board."

When Kem bought The Modern Pharmacy from the late Dave Griggs, uncle of Lloyd Griggs, the phone was already in the store. The store, incidentally, was located where The Club is now, at 522 Main.

Kem took the phone with him when he moved into his new location on the northwest corner of Sixth and Main January 1, 1931, where he remained until selling the drug store to Phil Varley this spring.

Actual tracking down on the correct age of the phone cannot be without flaw, but it seems likely that it was put in when the magneto telephone system was changed to the common battery type. This occurred in Cottage Grove between 1909 and 1911.

It also seems logical that the phone just removed at Varleys was an original installation since Dave Griggs was the agent for the Bohemia Telephone System, and then agent for Pacific T & T.

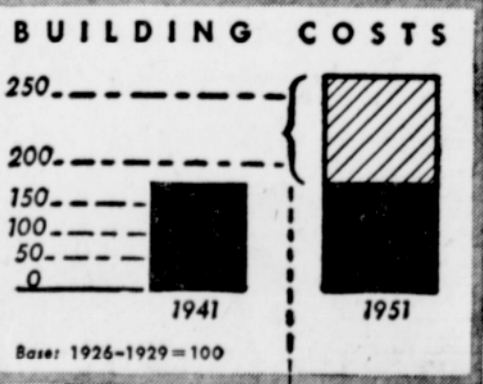
