The tank truck carries 1100 gallons of water and pumps 150 gallons of water a minute.
Besides all this, there is the Fire Chief's car, which is also used as a salvage car and carries regular salvage equipment, such as salvage covers, flood lamps, smoke ejector and mops and brooms.

The Fire Department is not short on manpower either. Including the Fire Chief, there are six paid firemen and about 25 active volunteers. Six to eight men are always at the fire department, which is located in the city hall, to answer any calls. They eat and sleep there. Regular firemen average working 72 hours a week.

The volunteer firemen are paid \$50 a month or \$600 a year, but the majority of this is put back into the department one way or another. For instance, upkeep telephone bills and such come out of this fund and any special projects the volunteers undertake. Their latest addition is a \$265 Scott air pack, which is a breathing apparatus.

Besides covering all the Cottage Grove fires, the fire department answers calls in the South Lane fire district which covers 144 square miles outside of the city limits and operate an ambulance service too.

The weather has been good so far this summer for keeping down fires, according to Chief Shipley. It has not been cold enough to necessitate having fires inside nor has it been warm enough for outside fires to catch easily.
