State Treasurer To Crack Down On Log Truck Drivers

State Treasurer Sig Unander is determined that log truck operators who wilfully overload their trucks be required to pay the full penalties prescribed by law, thus contributing to the cost of repairing roads broken down by their own actions.

An increasing tendency on the part of many justices of the peace in Oregon in remitting a portion of the fines assessed against the log truck operators has vexed Unander.

As a first step towards reaching his goal, Unander has requested Robert Y. Thornton, attorney general, to institute mandamus proceedings against a justice of the peace who has reduced the fine against a log hauler in order to test the law setting up the schedule of fines.

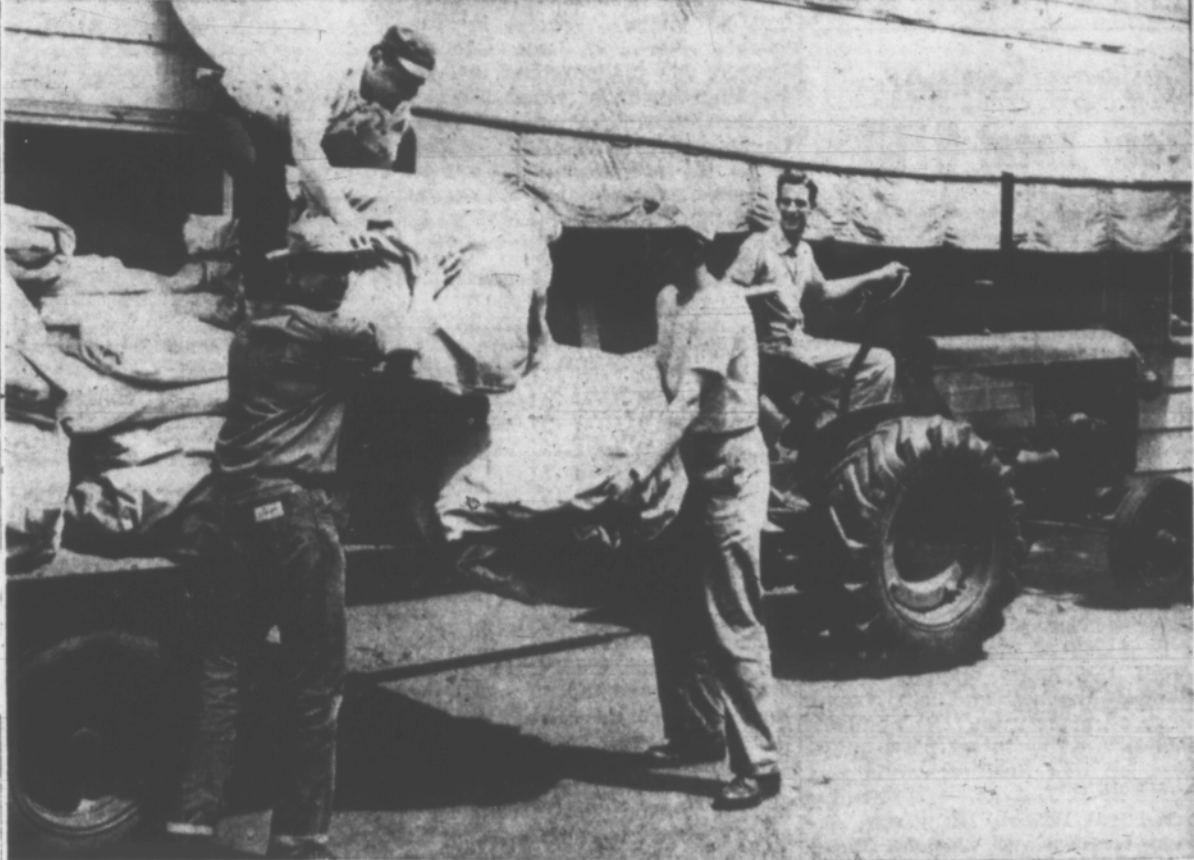
"Always a Few"

"I am well aware that many of the log truck operators are obeying the law," said the state treasurer. "But there are always a few who try to get by and it is this group that should pay the penalties prescribed by law. If they do they will be paying a portion of the cost of repairing highways that they damage instead of placing that burden on automobile owners and other road users."

Unander requested institution of legal action after being advised by Thornton that the power to remit fines rests only with the governor of the state under provisions of the state constitution.

If the circuit court upholds Unander's contention that remission of portions of fines assessed against log truck operators is illegal, he announced he will then request the attorney general to file suit for recovery of money to the state as the result of reducing these fines from January 1, 1954 to the present time. Unander says that statistics prepared by the state highway department show that the reduction of fines has cost the state of Oregon hundreds of thousands of dollars since the first of the present year.

While the practice of reducing fines is fairly general throughout the state, Unander has found that the justices of peace in Lane

County do so most frequently and therefore he has suggested to Thornton that a Lane county justice of peace be made defendant in the proposed suit while he himself has offered to appear as relator in the proceeding.

Oregonians to Get POW Benefits 1st

A last minute search for 24 Oregonians is being made by the War Claims commission, Washington, D.C., to inform them of their rights to apply for World War II prisoner-of-war benefits before the deadline expires August 1. Benefits in some cases range as high as \$1,500.

Under an amendment to the war claims act of 1948, military personnel are entitled to \$150 for each day they were subjected to forced labor or inhumane treatment while interned by the enemy during World War II.

This payment was in addition to the original benefit provided in the 1948 act which paid \$1 for each day the prisoner failed to receive adequate food from his captors. The persons now being sought by the war claims agency are those who benefited under the first act but failed to apply for the later payment.

Application to the War Claims commission, Washington 25, D.C., must be postmarked not later than midnight, August 1. Application blanks may be obtained through county service officers or the state Veterans' Department, Salem or Portland.

Oregonian Veteran Loans on Increase

Veterans of World War II and Korea have borrowed more than \$60,000,000 from the State of Oregon to acquire their own homes and farms, the Department of Veterans' Affairs reported this week.

Ernest J. Smith, loan supervisor for the state veterans' department, which administers the program, said figures at the close of the fiscal year on June 30 disclosed that 12,827 veterans had borrowed \$60,845,039 for home and farm purchase since 1945.

The past fiscal year set a new record in loan volume, with 2,655 veterans borrowing \$17,084,550, or more than twice as much as the largest previous year of 1949-50 when loans went slightly over the \$8,000,000 mark.

Main reason for the increase, Smith said, was the amendment to the state loan act by the 1953 legislature which raised the maximum amount veterans could borrow from \$6,000 on both homes and farms, to \$9,000 for homes and \$15,000 for farms.

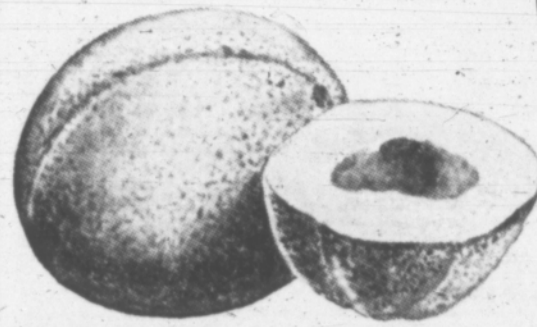
An average of 241 veterans have obtained the 4 percent loan at the rate of \$1,587,930 every month since last September. Of the \$60,000,000 loaned out, veterans have repaid over \$16,000,000 in principal and \$4,000,000 in interest.

The veterans' department has issued \$53,000,000 in bonds to finance the program, at an average interest cost of 1.87 percent. The favorable difference between the bond costs and the 4 percent interest on veterans' loans enables the program to pay its own way and pay the principal and interest on the bonds.
