Clifford Cross Drowns July 14

CRESWELL—Clifford Dwight Cross, 28, of 777 Partridge Way, Eugene, was drowned in an irrigation reservoir on the Harry Holt ranch on Howe Lane Wednesday evening, but the body was not found until the middle of the forenoon of Thursday.

Cross, who was head meat-cutter for a store in Eugene, was swimming at the reservoir with two nephews, Mack King, 9 and Oavid King, 11 and a neighbor boy, Jackie Sanger, 11. Apparently Cross was taken with cramps after jumping off a raft. He called for help and sank. Mrs. Cross was notified by the boys and she in turn called the Creswell fire department, who responded with the inhalator. Later grappling hooks and a boat were put in service to locate the body.

Clifford Dwight Cross was born in Sioux City, Iowa, May 8, 1926. He was married to Nana Lee Cook at Montrose, Colo., February 23, 1947. He had been a resident of Oregon for three years. He was a veteran of World War II as Seaman 1/C in the US Navy. He was a member of the Moose Lodge of Cottage Grove. He is survived by his wife, one daughter, Yvonne Arlene; one son, Ronald Clifford; his mother, Frances Price of Montrose, Colo.; three sisters and three brothers. Funeral services were held Monday, July 19, 1954, in Eugene with interment in West Lawn Cemetery.

Benter Farms Cow Milk Output Over 1 1/2 Tons per Month

CRESWELL—Benter Farms of Creswell, Route 2, breeders of registered Holsteins, are owners of one of the highest producing cows on record. Ormsby Uniform Inez, six years old, produced 98.1 pounds of milk testing 4.4 per cent in two milkings in one day. This is over 1 1/2 tons of milk per month.

Inez weighs about 1,500 pounds and produced more than double her weight in one month. The test was made by a supervisor of the Dairy Herd Improvement Association.

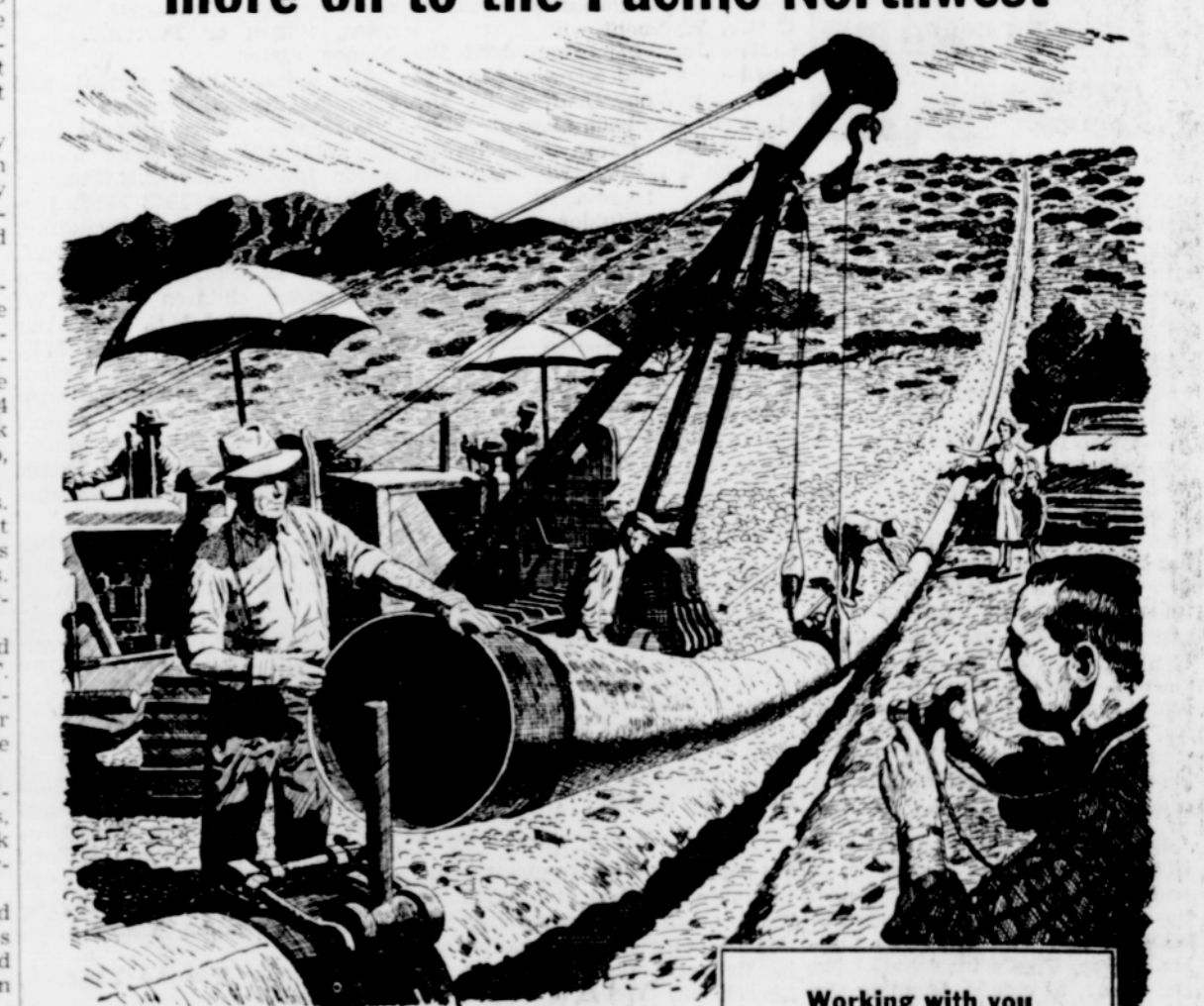
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Weekend Visits Top Walker News
