Strike Situation Remains Uncertain

The strike against the Northwest Douglas fir timber industries by the International Woodworkers of America, CIO, and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers, AFL, entered its second month last week with the negotiating committees of both unions and management holding firmly to their positions.

On the local scene, CIO secretary Larry Kellogg stated that nothing new has come up and there has been no word from the Central Negotiating Committee in Portland. Kellogg thought that the recent return to work of the large Weyerhaeuser concern in Klamath Falls has done little to "persuade" others to follow.

Strike for 12½ Cents

Both the IWA and the LSW are striking for a 12½ cent hourly wage increase. Employers have contended, since negotiations began some seven months ago, that the economic position of the industry does not justify a wage increase. Their position is supported by West Coast Lumbermen's Association figures which show that the price of lumber in April, before the strike, was \$10 per thousand feet below the average price when the last wage increase was granted in 1952.

Operators discount price increases which have resulted from the strike as a proper base on which to grant cost increases, and point to the June 28 U. S. Army auction where 33 million feet of lumber were sold for post-strike deliveries at only \$2.25 per M over the pre-strike auction level.

Employers Unchanged — In a number of negotiating sessions with both unions, labor negotiators have attempted to refute employer figures on production and profits but at the last top session with the IWA, employer spokesman H. J. Greeley made it clear that the employers were no longer interested in "statistical arguments."

What Greeley did say, in a statement signed by the eight firm employer associations, was that the union's strike in no way altered the employers' position but that their final offer of a renewal of contracts without change still remains.

Oregon May Not Law to Control Top Speed Limit

If legislation about to be recommended by the Highway Lifesavers Committee of Oregon Citizens, Inc., is accepted by the 1955 Oregon Legislature, Oregon will not impose an absolute top speed limit on highways, but the Basic Rule for driving in Oregon will be amended in two essentials. One proposed amendment will be a clarification of the law to make present indicated and posted speeds mean something, with no misunderstanding on the part of the public that they are merely advisory, and another will make it unnecessary for arresting officers to specify speed, should arrests be made where the Basic Rule is being violated in the officer's opinion. The Basic Rule requires reasonable and prudent driving at all times and in all places, conditions considered.

Following a conference on the Basic Rule, May 6, at Salem, when the Lifesavers Committee sought to learn whether to recommend a maximum top speed limit, a subcommittee was set up to compose difference of opinions with the result that the following four recommendations were adopted as the guide to the state-wide Committee in its recommendations to the Interim Committee of the Legislature:

Basic Rule Unchanged

1. That the Basic Rule be retained as the fundamental traffic law for Oregon.

2. That the law be amended so that an arresting officer shall not have to specify the actual miles per hour when making an arrest if the defendant was not driving in a reasonable and prudent manner as required under the Basic Rule. (At present, the officer must specify the speed at which an alleged offender was driving.)

3. That the proper Interim Committee of the Legislature consider clarifying the Basic Rule law to make it the Basic Rule-Plus-Prima-Facie-Speed Limits, so that the public will understand "prima facie" or designated and posted speeds are legal limits where posted—and not merely advisory, and that evidence of driving beyond the posted speed shall be sufficient unless the defendant can prove that conditions made that speed reasonable and prudent as required under the Basic Rule. (This recommendation carries the request that posted or prima facie speeds be set at the speed 85 per cent of the driving public moves in the posted areas, and means that prima facie speeds can be above or below the 55 miles an hour as now provided.)

Information Program

4. That the legislature support, financially and otherwise, a public information program so that the public, courts, prosecutors and officers all understand the Basic Rule and prima facie speed.

Prima facie speed is now 55 miles an hour under the law, or lower where posted. The public, however, apparently thinks posted speeds merely "advisory." This is not the case according to traffic officers, but the Highway Lifesavers Committee of Citizens took the position in its recommendations that the public is confused

on this and other points and that clarification is necessary.

If legislation is enacted on the basis of the recommendations, Oregon will not have a maximum, top speed limit, but the prima facie or posted speeds could be above or below 55 miles an hour as now specified in the law.

Patterson Suggests Subcommittee

The Subcommittee on the Basic Rule was set up by E. C. Sammons, president of the Highway Lifesavers Committee, as a result of a suggestion by Governor Paul L. Patterson, at the May 6 conference in Salem, when it became apparent that traffic authorities were not in agreement on the value of imposing an absolute maximum speed limit in Oregon.

According to Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock, 48 per cent of all the states have the Basic Rule with indicated or prima facie speed limits such as Oregon; 19 per cent have Basic Rule without indicated speeds, and the others have absolute limits.

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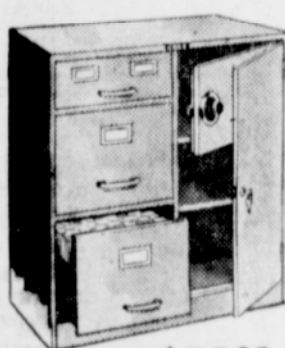
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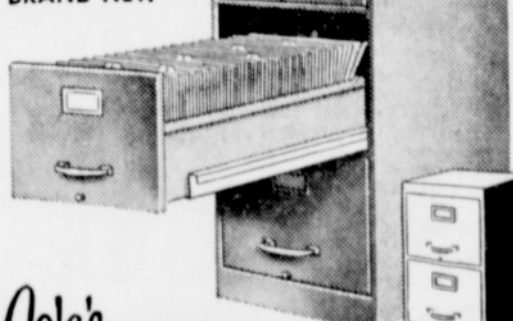


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
